

P. L. KIMBERLY'S LATEST DEAL With Pittsburg and Cleveland Talent He Takes Over Mines. PAYMENT OF \$1,000,000 MADE. PLOCHÉ TO BOOM—U. S. TRAM IN OPERATION.

(Special to The Herald.) PORT ARTHUR, Nov. 8.—A special from P. L. Kimberly, who is interested in several Utah properties, Mr. G. Pollock and other capitalists of Pittsburg and Cleveland, have purchased the famous Lake Superior Consolidated Silver Mines company.

For these properties, which have been held for many years, Kimberly and his associates have paid \$1,000,000 down and taken possession. They will spend several hundred thousands more on improvements and new equipment.

PLOCHÉ TO THE FRONT. A Boom in the Surrounding Mines Is Maturing. All kinds of interest is beginning to enter in the mines around Ploché, operators, investors, experts and promoters all being awake to the fact that the next few months are going to witness a boom down in that region.

Tomorrow night C. O. Whittemore, who has a contract with H. B. Clavin and the other owners of the Ploché Consolidated to negotiate the sale of that company's vast holdings, will be in camp, accompanied by Ernest Sam T. Goble, who is the manager of the properties owned by the company and familiarized himself with its magnitude and possibilities. It is very probable that Mr. P. G. Gilbert, the well known operator and promoter, will accept the invitation that has been extended to him to go along and size up the country.

When questioned regarding his plans for the Ploché, Mr. Whittemore declared that it was not too early for him to say just what would be done, but he is frank in acknowledging that he expects to do business in the not distant future, refraining from going into detail. The properties that he has secured include some of the most famous in the mines of Utah. It is safe to say that it will take \$1,000,000 at least to land them.

Several strong combinations are already forming in the Ploché district, and it is believed that the geographical center and others are preparing to acquire the Ploché. The Manhattan company, E. F. Bristol and Hillside companies are now "making hay," and several new houses have also planted their flags in the Ploché. The Ploché City operators have secured a dividend and are now pouring their money into the ground, while the forces being organized to invade the Silver King district to the northwest.

U. S. TRAM IN OPERATION. Adjustments About Completed—One Already Being Moved. The cheering information was caught in from the properties of the United States Mining company yesterday that the big aerial tramway is rapidly adjusted to a point where it will do its work without a bobble. Friday sixty buckets of ore containing 1,900 pounds each were sent over the line in a single hour from one of the upper spurs, and during the next few days there will be a constant stream of ore. The entire system will be in perfect working order. The difficulty has been in making the buckets hold the ore, and the Ploché has been carrying the buckets firmly in place on the carrying cable, but that trouble is now practically overcome, and when final tests are made the maximum loads of between 1,200 and 1,400 pounds will be added with perfect safety.

DEEP CREEK MINE BONDED. Frank L. Wilson Secures the Property Under a Year's Option. Frank L. Wilson, the well known Deep Creek mining operator, has just taken a bond on the Gracie Mining company's property, in the Clifton district, by the terms of which he has one year in which to make final payment on the agreed purchase price. The Gracie is a Texas organization, and during its ownership of the six claims comprising its holdings, about \$10,000 has been expended in development work, and the property is now being worked by men at work in the near future and go on with the exploration of the ore bodies already exposed—ore bodies that promise to make a big showing in the near future.

The property is located about two and one-half miles north of the Midas and the same distance south of the Clifton Copper Belt company's mines. The main lead running through the property lies against a mammoth porphyry dike that forms the foot wall and can be plainly followed out of the Gracie ground into the Cyclone property belonging to Captain Duncan McVie, where monster ore bodies are now said to be ready to supply a large tonnage whenever transportation or re-duction facilities are provided.

The Gracie vein has been opened through a tunnel about 200 feet long at a depth of 100 feet. In these workings there is one foot of silver ore that appears on one side of the vein, while on the other there is over two feet of iron ore carrying 10 per cent copper and from \$6 to \$10 in gold per ton. Hand samples of the galena have given returns of forty to 100 ounces silver and 45 to 60 per cent lead.
