MAGNATES CLASH OVER AGREEMENT

Moguls Fail to Ratify Action of Peace Conference.

VOTE STANDS SIX TO TWO

NEW YORK AND BROOKLYN AGAINST REST OF LEAGUE.

Cincinnati, Jan. 20.—The National Baseball league today had the hearing of the injunction cases at Philadelphia postponed until Friday so as to continue consideration of the report of the committee on terms of agreement with the American league at this adjourned annual meeting.

After being in session all day, the committee of the whole committee its work, and at 7 p. m. took a recess until 10 a. m. tomorrow, when majority reports will be reported, one by President Hinman and the other by President Brush of New York.

Boston Team Favored Majority.

The Boston club is in the position of being in favor of the most of the majority reports and a small number of the minority reports. In all of the ballots in committee of whole, the vote on sections 1, 2 and 4 of the proposed agreement between the two leagues was six to two, and New York and Brooklyn voting in the negative.

On section 6, for a schedule committee, on section 7, on the negative on rules, and on section 8, for a national agreement between major and minor leagues, the vote was six to two, New York and Brooklyn refusing to vote.
