

SICK AND DESPONDENT Jacob Gunner Took His Own Life at Milford. FORMERLY OF SALT LAKE BODY HELD TO AWAIT WORD FROM RELATIVES.

(Special to The Herald) Milford, Utah, Feb. 18.—Jacob Gunner, formerly in the employ of the Salt Lake City Street Railway company, committed suicide here today by taking a dose of cyanide. He did not leave his room at the Hardy Hotel until after midnight. He was found in his room this morning by a janitor. An advertising firm in Ohio addressed to him at St. George revealed his identity. He wore a street car uniform and a cane. He had been in the employ of the Salt Lake City Street Railway company. He was suffering from consumption and despondency. It is supposed to have been the cause of his death. A check watch and 25 cents in money were the only valuables found upon the body. He will be buried here at the expense of the county, unless relatives are located.

ABOUT BIG PROJECTS Engineer Schuyler Tells of Colossal Engineering Feats on Snake River and in California.

J. D. Schuyler, one of the most prominent engineers of the country, is a graduate of the Knutsford hotel. Mr. Schuyler has been identified with colossal engineering feats in the west, and he is in the city to consult with promoters of the Glen's Falls Land & Power company regarding the construction of three mammoth dams on the Snake river, twenty miles north of Shoshone Falls. The undertaking will involve the expenditure of \$1,000,000. There are also ninety miles of canal to build.

The company has secured control of 27,000 acres of land in the state of Idaho. This will be placed under irrigation and as soon as the work is completed will be placed on the market. The work will require about a year, and 500 families are ready to move into this tract when it is ready for occupancy. Among those who are interested in the project are Peter L. Kimberley and Frank H. Buhl, the Pittsburgh iron men. They are also interested in western mining properties.

Mr. Schuyler is also engineering the construction of the great dams for the Western Power company in California. These dams will be developed when completed, 360,000 horsepower, and will be about the greatest power producers in the world next to the Niagara. For the present, however, only about 60,000 horsepower will be developed. The work will require the expenditure of \$10,000,000. Both a financial and engineering standpoint this is one of the greatest feats of the kind that has been undertaken in the country. He has been consulting engineer in the construction of other large dams and canals. He built the great Sweetwater dam in the state of California, and also engineered the construction of the dams for the Portland Ore. Waterworks.

He is directing the work of two large systems in California which will irrigate 200,000 acres of land, and he built the Hoover canal in the Cache Valley country.

GETS COLORADO SLAYER. Night Watchman Says That He Has Felix Crunk.

A man said to be Felix Crunk, who is wanted for murder in Colorado, was captured in this city last night by Night Watchman R. W. Wilkinson at the Rio Grande depot. Crunk is wanted for killing a man by the name of Hugh Roberts in Rio Blanco county, near Grand Junction, Colorado. Crunk's partner committed the crime and then escaped to Grand Junction, Colorado. Crunk's partner was captured there and Crunk came on to Salt Lake.

Descriptions of him were sent here and last night Wilkinson saw a man who answers the description of Crunk, and also to a missing front tooth, get off the train from Ogden. Wilkinson immediately arrested him and found a big gun hidden away in his boot leg.

The man would not deny or admit that his name was Crunk, but the description agrees so perfectly that the officers are confident they have the right man. A message was sent to Meeker, county seat of Rio Blanco county, Colorado, to arrest of the suspect.

KILL COTTAGE SCHEME Health Board Sends William Barnett to Isolation Hospital— Avoids a Precedent.

William Barnett, the well known broker who has smallpox, was taken to the isolation hospital yesterday afternoon, and by his removal the board of health has avoided a precedent which will be hard to break down in the future. It was to the effect that a private dwelling could not be rented for the detention of a patient afflicted with that disease.

When Broker Barnett became convinced that he had smallpox, and was told that he could not rent in the Hooper block, but must go out to the isolation hospital, his father, Joshua Barnett, of the McCormick bank, secured permission of the health board to place his son in some quarantined family if one could be found which would consent to take care of him. Efforts to find a family, Banker Barnett asked the board to permit him to rent a vacant house for his son and temporarily fit it out for his use.

The board demurred on the ground that it would be establishing a troublesome precedent. It was also ruled that the health board was not to extend over a period of more than three weeks.

Only one new case of smallpox was reported to the board of health yesterday, that of James W. McLaughlin, aged 26, of Park City. He was sent out to the isolation hospital.

Money in Wells-Fargo Safe Is Not Yet Available.

Still the vault of the Wells-Fargo bank remains unopened. Fifteen thousand dollars of the bank's funds are in the vault, but every effort to get at the money is futile. The bank people are loth to use dynamite or nitro-glycerine, but they are beginning to think that it is the only way out of the difficulty.

Yesterday efforts were again made to cut the vault open with chisels and drills, but with a whole day's work on the hard steel of the door there was no more results than a few scratches on the door. The steel of the vault bears upon it, and the bank officials feel confident now that there is no danger of the bank ever being robbed of its treasure by burglars—at least if they attempt to drill open the vault.

Another effort will be made to open the door, and if it is not successful it will be left open. It is stated that the bank officials do not want to employ this means if it can be avoided, because of the damage that would of necessity result to the whole vault should such a method be used.


