THOUSANDS ARE STARVING.

REFeree WHITE ON M'GOVERN BETTER MAN WINS WRESTLING BOUT

Gives Opinion of Coming Championship Contest.

THINKS CHANCES ARE EVEN SAYS TERRY IS AS GOOD A MAN NOW AS EVER.

With the McGovern-Young Corbett fight only a little over a week off, interest in that event is becoming very great, not only in Salt Lake, but all over the country. While Young Corbett is the champion, conservative sporting authorities agree that McGovern will enter the ring a favorite. The odds in the betting have not been settled yet, but the men will very likely enter the ring at about 10 to 7 on McGovern. It may be that the great amount of McGovern money now finding its way to the surface will force even greater odds than this. In commenting on the fight Charlie White, the well-known referee, has the following to say:

"Terry McGovern was, when he won the featherweight championship, the greatest little Queensberry glove fighter of his day. Since that time Terry's life of theatrical engagements has led him to neglect his training and he has gone back in form. His defeat by Young Corbett has led many to think that the stage was his Waterloo. McGovern denies this.

"In the first round of his fight with Maynard, McGovern had all the best of it. The second round began with Terry little less than a cyclone, but as he proceeded, all his defects began to develop. Suddenly he slowed up, apparently to get wind. Maynard then became the aggressor and hit safely as often as Terry, who, had he been in his former condition, would have ended it in one or two good jabs. Distinctly Terry did not show his punching ability, or Maynard would not have lived through that second round.

"At the end of the third round Terry, to my way of thinking, was a bit tired in his legs. Terry must change his style of training, and a little of his ideas of living to get back his wind and to retain his strength of legs. These are McGovern's three defects.

"He stops punches with his head and face, knowing that he can eat them up. He swings wild and has lost his accuracy of aim through anxiety and a bit of falling eyesight. His new ideas of training himself along the old lines, with a little side issue of indulgence, have impaired Terry's wind and leg work.

"Should McGovern correct the faults indicated here, the next championship battle should be a great one and should be in doubt from the time the men enter the ring. In my judgment it would be an even break."

Charlie Ross Too Much For George McLaughlin.

CROWD IS WELL PLEASED LOCAL ATHLETES PUT UP CLEVER PERFORMANCES.

A fair sized crowd gathered at the Grand theatre to witness the wrestling contest between G. C. McLaughlin and Charlie Ross last evening, the latter winning three out of the five falls. White the outcome was a great surprise to many, yet the besting man won. Ross is far the cleverer of the two, which he plainly showed throughout the bout last evening.

Taking the match through and through, it was a very clever exhibition of mat work. All the tricks known to the profession were brought into play by Ross, who handled his bigger, stronger and heavier opponent with ease. Head spins, bridges, fancy arm-locks and all these holds that make wrestling a good sport to look upon were used with remarkable frequency. Time and again Ross crossed fairly stood on its feet, expecting the much-vaunted fall to appear within an inch of the mat, while the crowd appeared entirely satisfied with the exhibition and many expressions of this kind were heard after the contest. The bout proved one thing, and that is that Ross as a wrestler is a hard man in his class and can give his exhibition with a storm scene, having an attachment to the regular platform that throws out electric sparks every time the bag comes into contact with the face of the platform.
