Washington, April 7.—Mr. Cromwell, counsel for the Panama Canal company, and Admiral Walker met at the state department today to talk to Secretary Hay about the work of the subcommittee, which is to meet on the isthmus to appraise the value of the work the company is now doing on the canal.

Belgrade, Servia, April 7.—King Alexander today executed a coup d'etat. He issued two proclamations, the first decreeing a suspension of the constitution, adopted April 12, 1901, repealing objectionable laws passed thereunder, retiring the senators and councilors of state, dissolving the skupstina and re-enacting the laws as they existed previous to the constitution of 1901.

Vienna, April 7.—The Serbian court-d'etat, according to Belgrade dispatches here, was simply to wipe out the false steps taken since the amended constitution was granted in 1901 and to make a fresh start. The constitution was only suspended for a few minutes, during which certain laws were annulled and provisionally replaced by new laws more in accord with the constitution.

Admiral Walker's estimate of the number of men to be employed on the Panama canal when the United States formally shall have entered upon the project is 30,000. For all practical purposes this government now is engaged in the construction of the canal. Under the agreement signed May 3 by Secretary Hay and Mr. Cromwell, the American representative of the new Panama Canal company, the work of construction was to be continued by the new canal company until the exchange of ratifications of the canal treaty, with the understanding that the United States should pay for such construction work.

One of the purposes of a visit to the isthmus soon to be made of a subcommittee of the present canal commission is to study the labor organization as it relates to the construction of the waterway, with a view of ascertaining a source from which an additional labor supply may be obtained. The local labor supply is insufficient to meet the demand. It is probable, therefore, that laborers will be drawn by the thousand from the southern states and the islands of the West Indies. As the labor supply is contracted by a company organized for the purpose, it is quite likely that many Chinese and Japanese laborers will be imported for work on the canal.
