

STEADY GROWTH IN OUR EXPORTS

Competition Does Not Seem to Have Any Effect.

IMPORTS ARE ALSO LARGER NO CAUSE FOR RECENT NOTES OF ALARM.

(Special to The Herald.) Washington, May 24.—The alarms which have been sounded during the past two years regarding the trade relations between the United States and certain other countries find no justification in the figures of our commerce up to this time, as compiled by the treasury bureau of statistics. The three countries which have threatened from time to time to increase their importations from the United States are Russia, Austria-Hungary and Germany. Recent investigations show a steady growth in the exports from the United States to those three countries, and indicate that our commerce with each of them is likely to be larger in the present fiscal year than in any previous year of our commercial history. This is equally true of both imports and exports.

SERIOUS GAS EXPLOSION. Five People Severely Injured at San Francisco.

San Francisco, May 24.—Five persons were severely injured by an explosion of gas yesterday. Howard J. Lewis, printer, moved into 2613 Howard street and soon after the gas was turned on, odor permeating the place. Lewis, who had an old gas range connection had not been closed, and he stopped the opening with a cork. He then lit a match, and the gas was still escaping. An explosion followed, blowing Lewis and three others unconscious. His clothing was rendered entirely black. In the room at the time were Mrs. Thomas H. Lawler, the aged mother of the printer; Mrs. T. R. Lawler, Jr., his sister-in-law, and two children of the latter. All were more or less severely injured.

ONLY CHILD DIES.—Houston Johnson, the 2-month-old son of C. W. and Mary Eager Johnson, died last night at the home of his parents on Fifth East street. The baby was taken sick several days ago, but it was not thought that the ailment was of a serious nature. The condition of the mother gradually worsened, though, until death released him from his suffering last night. The little fellow was the only child of the family. Arrangements will be announced later.

RIO GRANDE BLOCKED.

No Trains Arrive, and Officials Proffess Ignorance.

Not a Rio Grande train from the east arrived in the city yesterday. At midnight last night the 10:30 train was reported three hours late, and it was not known definitely whether it would arrive at all or not.

Just what the trouble was could not be learned at the offices. It was stated at headquarters that the train was gradually held up by a washout, but the cause or locality of the delay had not been received. It is understood, however, that an accident somewhere in the mountainous region is holding up the trains. It is thought probable that the delay may be caused by a washout resulting from the recent severe storms.

TROOPS ARRIVE IN KEEP ORDER

Investigation of the Marcum Murder at Jackson, Ky.

GRAND JURY WILL BE CALLED FEUDISTS ON THE TRAIN WITH THE SOLDIERS.

Jackson, Ky., May 24.—A battalion of troops numbering 120 men, with a Gatling gun, arrived here this afternoon to preserve order in the town and about the court house during the investigation of the assassination of James B. Marcum, the last victim of the Hargis-Cockrill feud. The troops arrived on a special train from Lexington and at once pitched camp near the center of town.

Traveling on the special train with the soldiers were County Judge James Hargis and his brother, State Senator Alex Hargis, the two most prominent members of the Hargis family. Another passenger was Judge Bach, who is regarded as the most important of the witnesses summoned to testify before the special grand jury as to the assassination of Marcum. Judge Bach returned from Los Angeles, Cal., to give evidence. During the course of an interview he expressed the belief that no disorder would occur as long as the troops remained. Judge Bach said he did not fear a personal attack, and declared that he would remain at his home without taking any special measures for self-protection.

Public opinion is divided as to the probability of indictment or conviction of Marcum's assassin as a result of the work of the special grand jury which will be impaneled. Curtis Jett, who is under arrest at Winchester charged with the crime will not ask for a change of venue if indicted and returned to Jackson.

James Rutherford Morris. Utica, N. Y., May 24.—James Rutherford Morris, aged 72, a member of the old and distinguished family of that name, died at Morris, N. Y. He was a grandson of General Jacob Morris, whose father, Lewis Morris, was a signer of the Declaration of Independence. Mr. Morris was the father of Dr. Lewis Rutherford Morris of New York, who married a daughter of United States Senator W. A. Clark of Montana.

Mrs. Clementine Papin-Carrier. St. Louis, May 24.—Mrs. Clementine Papin-Carrier, who was born in St. Louis in 1818, died here today. She was one of the oldest native-born women in St. Louis and had many illustrious ancestors. She was a great-great-granddaughter of Pierre La Clede, the founder of St. Louis.

THE DEATH RECORD.

Paul Blouet. Paris, May 25.—Paul Blouet (Max O'Rell) died last night. He has been ailing for several months and never recovered entirely from the effects of an operation performed some time ago in New York.

TRAGEDY IN OREGON.

Old Man Killed by Brute of a Son-in-Law. Portland, Ore., May 24.—Maddened by the fact that his wife had obtained a divorce from him two weeks ago, M. Y. Lesia this morning wreaked a terrible vengeance upon his father-in-law, F. H. Lesia, by sending two bullets through the old man's back, killing him instantly. Lesia's former wife witnessed the awful tragedy and was later compelled to accompany Lesia to Paris unknown. Before disappearing Lesia and his former wife appeared at the residence of a neighbor, whom the murderer asked to care for his babies for an hour or two, saying that Drews had been injured by a falling timber in a fire and that he and his wife would return to his assistance. After leaving the babies with the neighbor, the murderer and his wife disappeared and have not yet been located. Lesia alleged that Drews was instrumental in starting the divorce proceedings and for this reason he shot him.

CATTLEMAN CONVICTED.

Outcome of a Fierce Range War in Oklahoma. Guthrie, O. T., May 24.—On trial at Taloga, O. T., charged with shooting at homesteaders with intent to kill, Frank Speer, a prominent cattleman, has been convicted. The shooting was the culmination of a feud of long standing between the cattleman and farmers of western Oklahoma. Frank, Jim and Mert Speer, brothers; George Ivy, William Murphy and Daniel Holcomb have also been indicted under the federal laws for alleged conspiracy to prevent homesteaders from taking peaceful possession of their claims. After Frank Speer was convicted the federal cases were continued until next term. A homesteader, James McKinzie, charged with shooting at cattleman, was acquitted. The prominence of the cattleman has made the case very important.

LOSS ESTIMATED AT ONE MILLION DOLLARS

Philadelphia, May 24.—Fire this evening in the building of the Front Street Warehousing company caused a loss estimated at \$1,000,000. The building, which was three stories high on Front street and five in the rear, with two sub-basements, contained merchandise of various character. The floor was packed solidly with matting, and there were 1,500 rolls of carpet, 500 barrels of molasses, a carload of wines and other heavy structure was soon ablaze. The contents of the building were owned by many firms and individuals, and it is not known tonight what amount of insurance was carried.

IGNORANCE AND AGE SAVED HIM FROM JAIL

Guthrie, O. T., May 24.—Amos Leedy, aged 60 years, postmaster at Leedy, O. T., has pleaded guilty to the charge of detaining a valuable letter in land contest cases. The case is peculiar in that the letters remained in the office uncalled for and Leedy, ignorant of what course should be pursued, threw them into the waste basket. On account of his age he was let off with a fine and given permission to return home alone for the money to pay it with.

STRIKE OF COPPER.

Butte, Mont., May 24.—A special to the Miner from Pocatello, Ida., says: Excitement is intense here today over a new strike of copper ore line called east of this city. A lot of 40 per cent copper has been uncovered.
