

FROM THE PENS OF UTAH WOMEN

Many Articles in the June Number of the Aegis. BOTH PROSE AND POEM PICTURES BY SEVERAL OF THE LOCAL ARTISTS.

The June number of the Aegis is out and presents a gratifying spectacle to the Utah clubwomen. Nevertheless, it is not by any means up to the promise made in the first demand for material from Utah.

The Utah women are all very busy with their work from Utah, following a history of the civic federation movement in New York City, with the New York matter played up, and only one of the photographs of Utah women used—that of Mrs. C. E. Coulter. The magazine is a work of art, however, and what it shows up excellently. There are four pictures, two by Harry L. A. Culmer, "Great Salt Lake" and "Engle Gate"; "Sego Valley" by Edna Wells Sloan, and an Indian head by J. S. Sorenson. The pictures were furnished by the Crawford. The literary part includes a sketch of the federation by Mrs. Antoinette Kinney, the story of the first club house by Mrs. E. W. Wells, a paper on domestic service by Mrs. Chester E. Coulter, a dainty little story by Mrs. Morris L. Ritchie, a paper on suffrage by Mrs. Emily Richards, a brief sketch of the seal which is a Utah emblem by Alice Reynolds, some notes by Mrs. R. E. Cortman of Provo, and the following little poem by Mrs. F. C. Kelsey, which speaks for itself:

There is no law to keep me down Nor birth, nor ignorance, nor fate, An cloud my side, and I will rise, The goal is far, and steep and hard, Each single word, and every deed, But I shall win if yet e'er ends "Life's little day."

BIRTHS SHOW AN INCREASE

Number Last Week Was Three More Than One Before. The report of the board of health for the week ending June 13 shows three births more than the preceding week and one more than for the same period of last year, twenty-six births having been reported, the number of each sex being equal. The number of deaths during the week, and two cases prevailed among decedents, eight deaths of each sex being reported during the week, though more than one-third of the number in detention at the same time last year.

At the close of the last report there were five cases of diphtheria in detention. Seven new cases developed during the week, and three having been discharged, left in custody a quarantine, as compared with five for the same week last year. While the new cases of smallpox during the week, though more than one-third of the number in quarantine is five more than for the week ending June 6, eight new cases developed during the period covered by this report, leaving thirty-eight cases in detention. Four cases of typhoid fever and one case each of typhoid fever and chicken pox were also reported.

STATE RESTS IN DR. PAYNE CASE

Defense Moved That Charge of Murder Be Dismissed.

REQUEST REFUSED BY JUDGE PRISONER ON STAND TO TELL ABOUT HIS FINANCES.

The state rested in the Dr. E. S. Payne murder case shortly before 11 o'clock yesterday morning and immediately afterwards Attorney Wantless moved that his client be discharged on the ground that there was not sufficient evidence to convict. Judge Morse overruled the motion without giving the district attorney an opportunity to reply to the arguments of the attorney for the defense.

Dr. Payne then took the stand. It was not to testify in his own behalf, but to be examined in regard to his personal property. He had previously filed an affidavit of impecuniosity and asked that the state bear the expense of the motion picture showing the trial of Dr. H. A. Anderson, who testified at the preliminary examination, and the picture of the alleged snuffbox.

Payne and His Property. District Attorney Eichnor was of the opinion that Dr. Payne had more property than he swore he owned, and was entitled to any relief from the state in the matter of his personal property. The doctor swore that the only property he owned is his house at 739 East Sixth south street, which he is paying for on the installment plan. He said he still owes \$1,100 on it, and that for five months he has not been able to pay a cent upon the principal, and that the interest upon the same has been accumulating all that time.

When the defendant left the witness stand he asked permission to visit his home, saying that he wished to show it to a prospective buyer. The request was granted by Judge Morse, who commissioned Deputy Sheriff Cowan to accompany him. He was not to permit anyone excepting the man who had been ready to purchase the house, their conversation to the reality deal. The first witness called yesterday morning was A. C. Smith, who conducted a drug store in the same building in which Dr. Payne had his office. He testified to seeing a prepossessing man, who he said resembled Miss Hill, ascending the stairs from the sidewalk leading to the physician's office. The man he said he met at the stairs was supposed to have visited the defendant.

Used Druggist's Telephone. Mr. Smith also testified that Dr. Payne was in the habit of using his telephone, and that he had seen him with other physicians or to converse with people on business matters generally. These facts were brought out by District Attorney Eichnor to show that Dr. Payne apparently had no excuse for jacking his office door and walking over to the police station to inform the authorities that a woman had died in his office; that he could have used the Smith drug store telephone.

The next witness was City Engineer J. C. Kelsey. He was called to testify as to the exact distance from the doctor's office to the police station. He said it measured exactly 1,684 feet, or three-quarters of a mile. The district attorney sought to show that under ordinary circumstances a person would not walk that distance to notify the police that a woman had died in his room when he could have used a telephone in a store in the same building. Last Witness For State. Detective George Chase was the last witness for the state. He was called solely to identify the roll of cheese cloth on exhibition as that which he saw in Dr. Payne's office. It was the same cloth which Mrs. Hill purchased of Clerk Jackson in Auerbach's store. It was at that juncture that Attorney Wantless asked for the dissection of the defendant. He spoke at length upon the motion, and his appeal for the acquittal of his client brought tears to the eyes of Mrs. Payne. After the motion had been denied, Dr. Payne took the witness stand in support of his attorney. When he had been excused, Judge Morse said he would adjourn court until Monday morning at 10 o'clock. The district attorney, Wantless will make his address to the jury in behalf of the defendant.

As far as known, Dr. Anderson, Harry Green and Dr. Payne himself will be the only witnesses for the defense. Should that prove to be the case, it is expected that the case will go to the jury not later than Tuesday afternoon or Wednesday morning.

District Court Notes.

Sarah E. Whitworth has sued the Salt Lake Hot Springs Sanitarium, alleged to have been done to her property at the corner of Second West and Sixth South streets by water from the company's flume escaping and killing the trees around her home. She valued the trees at \$500 and the depreciation of her property at \$500.

One year ago today the jury which tried Peter Mortensen for the murder of John Hay brought in a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree. The jury, which was out only a little over three hours, returned its verdict to the court about 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Mr. McDermott admitted that he had skipped out and asked Carey to forgive him, saying that the money he was crazy at the time. He attributed his actions to a prolonged indulgence in liquor. Dr. Payne said he was going to Tonopah and that as soon as he could he would return the money he had taken.

KEITH GIVES \$5,000

Well Known Mining Man Makes Generous Donation to Y. M. C. A. Building Fund.

David Keith contributed the sum of \$5,000 to the Y. M. C. A. building fund yesterday. This makes the amount raised just \$43,000 and leaves a balance of \$7,000 that must be raised before tomorrow night. When George Foster Peabody made his offer of \$25,000 to the association, it was with the understanding that the association would raise \$50,000 by the 1st of June. When it became apparent to Mr. Peabody that it would be impossible to raise this amount in that time he wired Secretary O. L. Cox notifying him that he would extend the time in it of his offer until the 15th. Monday will be that date and the \$50,000 must be raised by that time.

Seven thousand dollars is no small amount to be raised in that time, but the committee that are soliciting for the fund believe that some one or ones will come to the rescue, that all the efforts of the association may not come to naught when so much of the amount has already been secured.

If the necessary money is gotten by Monday night then the gift of Mr. Peabody will be assured and the committee will continue their canvass to raise \$25,000 more. It is their purpose to raise \$100,000 for a fully equipped building may be erected. The canvass will probably be dropped for a month during the summer, but is expected that the full amount will have been raised by fall.

FENDER SAVES CHILD.

Six-year-old Girl Has a Narrow Escape From Death.

Had it not been for the fender on a Seventh South street car, Ruby Davis, the 6-year-old daughter of James Davis of 428 West Seventh south street, would have been crushed to death Friday night beneath the wheels of the car. The fender saved her from any injury whatever.

The child was playing on the track about 8 o'clock. The car, in charge of Mortimer W. A. Ryver, was making its outbound trip. Mr. Ryver did not discover the child in the dark until the car was within two or three lengths of her. He rang the bell and shouted to her, but she appeared not to hear. Immediately he dropped the fender and reversed his car. Despite his efforts, the car ran upon the child and moved several yards down the track before it could be stopped. The fender did its work splendidly and caught the child. She was carried up until a stop was made. The motorman jumped out, expecting to see her ground to pieces, but she lay on the fender in perfect safety.

When she had been taken from under the car and examined it was found that she did not have even a bruise. The shock of coming in contact with the fender, that for a few moments dazed her, was the only injury she sustained.
