

DISSENSION IN NATIONAL GUARD Officers and Men Are Threatening to Withdraw.

INSPECTION CAUSES TROUBLE REPORT SENT TO ARMY HEAD-QUARTERS SCORES MEN.

Trouble has been precipitated in the ranks of the national guard as a result of the recent inspection by a regular army officer. Now officers and men are threatening to get out of the organization. The resignations of two officers have been received already and others have given notice that they intend to resign.

At a drill last night the notice of the acceptance of the resignation of Lieutenant Berch of company E at Bountiful was read. An officer of the guard who knows the conditions existing there stated that the resignation of Bountiful had rendered his resignation and asked for retirement. The same officer also stated that the officers of the company at Provo had given notice that they intend to resign. It is also stated upon good authority that unless matters are changed at headquarters an officer of high rank, who has been a faithful member of the guard for years, will hand in his resignation.

Cause of the Trouble. Reports to the commanding officers received here show that the members of the companies in the outside towns are dropping out. The cause of the trouble, according to the statement of an officer, is the recent inspection. "The boys worked hard," said he, "to get things in shape for the inspection. When the time rolled around they appeared with the idea that they were going to make a good showing. The regular officer kept them on the floor nearly three hours standing at attention. This, of course, wore them out and before the inspection was over some of the boys were unable to stand in as good military form as they might."

"The report sent in by the inspector scored the boys severely. He stated that they did not have their equipment in good shape and were not up to their military training. In fact every part of the guard was scored except the signals. Awarding to the boys and tried hard to prepare for inspections and did as well as they could. Then such a report to be made after they had spent several days for the inspection, and receiving nothing for their extra work. This, added to the condition of affairs at headquarters, has simply driven the boys and men who are talking of quitting the service. There is no longer any inducement to get new members, and nothing to hold the old ones."

Going to Pieces. "Company H, the local company, is going to piece together very slowly. It will not show interest in their drills when they are forced to stay in such a place as the army is. It is the opinion of the commanding officer that the company at Bountiful is about to be broken up. The resignation of Lieutenant Berch leaves them without an officer. At Provo not more than half of the members of company G remain in the guard. The company at Mantu is in the same condition. Company A at Nephi is the only one in the guard that has anything like a full quota of men. "The organization of the new company by Captain G. N. Warwick has also caused trouble. It has practically broken up the company at Provo. The boys look upon the new company as a society sort of organization that is going to have the best of everything, while they will have to do the work and get no recognition either."

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DEATH OF DR. BETTS Former Well Known Physician of This City Passes Away at Los Angeles.

News has reached this city of the death of Dr. William Betts, aged 41 years. Dr. Betts was afflicted with Bright's disease, and went from this city to Los Angeles in 1926, making the trip by team. His funeral will take place in Los Angeles on Sunday.

Dr. Betts practiced here as a specialist in diseases of the throat and lungs and was widely known in the medical profession through his researches on the subject of climatology. A few of his intimate acquaintances knew before he left Salt Lake for his trip across the desert to Los Angeles that there was little hope of his ultimate recovery from the disease, which had made its presence known, and which finally resulted in his death. In the spring of 1896 he made a trip with a companion to the southern part of the state and to the Grand Canyon of the Colorado. During this trip he collected a good deal of the material for the publications on climatology of the state and the Grand Canyon of the Colorado. One of his papers on the climate of the arid west in relation to diseases of the lungs was widely circulated and is accepted as standard authority on that subject.
