

ORDINANCE TO PREVENT FRAUD

Compels Employment Agencies to Give Bond.

MUST ALSO PAY A LICENSE

GIVES RECEIVED APPLICANTS FOR WORK ADDRESS.

The numerous and varied complaints which men and women are constantly making to the police against the employment agencies in this city have resulted in Councilman A. J. Davis preparing an ordinance compelling the proprietors of these places to pay a license and furnish a bond for the proper conduct of their business.

There are a number of employment agencies in the city which, it is claimed, are nothing more or less than schemes or grafts to fleece unsophisticated men, women and young boys from their money and giving them nothing in return excepting empty promises as almost as numerous as the various kinds of work the applicants apply for.

Many Complaints to Police. The police have the most trouble with the offices run by the agencies in the city. The applicant applies for a job. If he has money on his person after paying the fee for the prospective job, he is often invited into the saloon. Unless he is very wise it is not long before the man is relieved of his last cent. His money is either spent for drinks or he is "hooked" for it by saloon hangers-on.

Numerous complaints are also made that the Salt Lake agencies are in the habit of misrepresenting jobs to applicants. As the referee of the fees is ever-very seldom-made, the duped laborer has to stand the loss. The ordinance of Councilman Davis compels these agencies to pay a license of \$50 a year to do business. They are also required to furnish a \$1,000 bond for the proper conduct of their business, that a person deceived as to the kind of work he is led to believe he will get out of, have some redress. That section of the ordinance providing for the license and bond reads as follows:

Provisions of the Ordinance.

"It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in the business of conducting an employment agency or intelligence office within the limits of Salt Lake City without first obtaining a license for such business, which license shall continue for one year, and for which license such person shall pay into the city treasury the sum of sixty dollars (\$60) and give a bond to the city with sureties in the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), conditioned on the faithful observance of all the provisions of the city, and that he will pay all damages occasioned by any person by reason of any misstatement, misrepresentation, fraud or deceit of himself or any of his agents or employees."

Section No. 2 provides that the license shall be granted by the city council. The next section says that no agencies shall be opened in "any place where intoxicating liquors are sold, or in any billiard hall."

Any person violating any of the provisions of the ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$100, or by imprisonment not exceeding 30 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

FRANK WASHBURN IS DEAD

Well Known Salt Lake Elk Passes Away in Kansas City.

A. W. Raymond, secretary of Salt Lake City lodge No. 25, B. O. E. received a telegram yesterday morning, announcing the death in Kansas City on Tuesday night at 10 o'clock of Frank Washburn, a member of this lodge, who was well and favorably known in this city. The dispatch was sent by P. L. Mark, secretary of the lodge. Washburn died very suddenly and that the body would be sent to Buffalo for burial. It is thought that deceased succumbed to an attack of asthma.

Mr. Washburn was a resident of Salt Lake for several years, during which time he managed the Madison hotel. For a great many years he was identified in the hotel and dining car business, being connected with the Union Pacific Railroad company, hotel system and the Pacific Hotel company at Ogden, where he lived for some time, acting as manager of the latter.

At the time of his death Mr. Washburn was vice president of the Southwestern Hotel company in Kansas City, in which P. L. and E. Mark, both well known in this city, are interested.

LUKE PLACED UNDER ARREST

Ten Indictments Were For Collection Agent.

RELEASED ON \$1,500 BAIL

FIFTEEN MORE WARRANTS ARE TO BE SERVED TODAY.

Francis G. Luke, president of the Merchants' Protective association, was arrested upon ten separate charges yesterday as a result of the recent grand jury investigation of the methods of the association. The charges preferred against Mr. Luke were falsifying and removing and secreting public records, having been taken before Judge F. H. Clark and released upon bail to the amount of \$1,500. The time of trial of the cases will be set later.

The warrants against other fifteen counts returned by the grand jury have not been issued yet and as to whom they are against can only be surmised. The warrants will in all probability be issued today and placed in the hands of the sheriff.

The warrants against Luke involve cases in which it is claimed that Luke changed some records and secreted others in order to force certain collections that had been placed in his hands. The warrants were made out by County Clerk John James and given to Sheriff Emery at noon yesterday. The officer Mr. Luke at his office and served all ten of the warrants at once.

Mr. Luke was placed under arrest and in the afternoon was taken before Judge F. H. Clark for arraignment. He listened to the reading of the separate charges and entered a plea of not guilty to each one. The judge fixed the bail at \$150 in each case, making an aggregate of \$1,500. Ben Davis and F. G. Lyngberg went surety for the amount and Luke was released. Mr. Luke, in talking of the matter, declared that he was surprised in any such action had been taken. He declared that he did not know what the charges meant and that there was absolutely nothing to them. The grand jury, he declared, had not questioned him at all about the matters with which he was charged and he did not know what it all meant. He asserted that he was not guilty of a single charge and would be able to prove his innocence when the cases came to trial.

THEIR CASE WAS POSTPONED.

Cottrell and Fernstrom Secure a Continuance Until Monday.

President Charles Cottrell, Jr., and Councilman F. S. Fernstrom of the Third ward made their appearance in court yesterday morning before Judge Chris Diehl, when it was thought they would have their preliminary examination. (Owing to the absence of attorney George L. Nye, Judge Diehl postponed the case until Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, at which time the defendants promised to be ready to proceed with their case.

After the clerk of the court had read the complaint, Judge Diehl asked if both sides were ready to proceed. County Attorney Westervelt, who represents the city attorney, said he was. Councilman Fernstrom, who acted as spokesman for President Cottrell, said they were not ready, explaining that their attorney was in the city. The case was objected to by Attorney Westervelt on the grounds that the defendants had not made arrangements in which to prepare their case and have their attorney present. He looked upon the motion for a delay as another proof that the two city law makers do not appreciate the enormity of the crime charged against them, adding that he thought they were still further trying to make a "monkey" out of the prosecution.

Judge Diehl said he thought the excuse given in support of the motion was a rather slim one, but rather than railroad the defendants to trial, concluded to give them an extension of time until Monday, when the councilmen promised to have their attorney in court.

May Dismiss Contempt Charges.

The contempt case against Mrs. Julia Hansen came up before Judge Charles W. Morse this morning in the criminal division of the district court. The proceedings against her will probably be dismissed. At the same hour Attorney Will F. Washburn appeared before Judge Chris Diehl in the police court. It is expected that his honor will set the date for the preliminary examination. Attorney Washburn is under arrest on the charge of sending Mrs. Hansen out of the city to prevent her testifying against Charles Olney Robben, who was tried before Judge Morse on a delicate charge and given nine months in the county jail.

District Court Notes.

Martha R. King has brought suit for divorce from Lorin U. King on the grounds of desertion and failure to provide. The couple were married in this city on June 5, 1896.

Judge Thomas D. Lewis, the fourth judge of the Third judicial district, has adjourned his court until Saturday, July 11.

District Attorney Dennis C. Eichner is busily engaged in making out informations against a number of men under arrest at the county jail. They will be arraigned before Judge Charles W. Morse on Saturday morning.

Saturday will be sentence day with Judge Charles W. Morse. Z. Graham, Albert Clark and J. A. Clark will be sentenced at 10 o'clock. They have been convicted of grand larceny and receiving stolen property. They robbed C. V. Johnson of \$75 in a Commercial street saloon last April.

E. S. Kives and J. H. Rives have brought suit against Henry Altman, W. B. Mueckow, Chapman Mueckow & Bosson and the Majestic Copper Mining & Smelter company. Each recovered 18,698 2-3 shares of stock in the Majestic company, and \$5,000, their alleged interest in the sale of certain mining properties by Altman to the company.

C. W. Johnson of Murray has been brought over to the district court by Justice Holm on the charge of passing a fictitious check. His bond was fixed at \$500, in default of which he went to jail.
