

JOHN WALBUM BURNED TO DEATH

Attempted to Stamp Out Dying Embers of a Bonfire.

CLOTHES IGNITED READILY

SUCCESSFUL TO INJURIES AFTER FOUR HOURS' AGONY.

While playing around a bonfire yesterday afternoon, John R. Walbum, the 2-year-old son of Iver Walbum, 172 West Third South street, accidentally set fire to his clothing and was burned to death. The little fellow and some playmates were trying to stamp out the fire when the flames caught his dress. Burning from head to foot, the baby ran into the house to his mother. She tore the clothing from him, but he had already been so badly burned that death ensued about four hours later. The accident happened about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. At that time little John and some other children were playing in the front yard of the Walbum home. Mrs. Walbum was busy in the house, and Mr. Walbum was upstairs. The children raked together a pile of trash unknown to Mrs. Walbum and set fire to it. Soon the flames were burning brightly and the children were napping about the bonfire in the height of glee. As the flames began to die down, some of the larger children began to stamp out the coals and watch the sparks fly. Little John Walbum attempted to do likewise. Suddenly he gave a scream and the other children turned around and saw him running off with the flames consuming his skirts. None of the children was old enough to know what to do and ran in fright, calling for help.

Clothes All in a Blaze.

The child, with the flames crawling up toward his face, ran screaming across the yard and into the house, through the hall he continued until he found his mother. The latter heard his cries and rushing to him found his clothing almost burned from his body, and the flames blazing on his hands. Without thought of her own danger, the mother seized her little one and began to tear the burning clothing from his body. Although her own hands were burned, she gave no thought to her own pains until every stitch of the dress of her child had been torn away. By this time several of the neighbors had come to the aid of the mother. The child was immediately wrapped up and Dr. Gray was summoned. He used every remedy possible to save the child, but medical aid was of no avail. The flesh of the child's body was badly burned about the limbs, face, neck and arms. The face was disfigured almost beyond recognition. The sufferings of the little victim were most agonizing. Every effort was made to relieve him, but unsuccessfully. Death relieved the victim about 8 o'clock last night. The parents of the child are almost prostrated with grief and shock. The body of the child was taken in charge by Undertaker Joseph William Taylor. The funeral will be held at his parlors today at 4 o'clock.
