

MIGHTY FARMERS DOWN VARSITY

For First Time in Years Aggies Outplay State University Logan Goes Wild and Coach Holmes Burned in Effigy.

(Special to The Herald.) OGDEN, Oct. 17.—Twenty-five hundred people saw the Agricultural college football eleven defeat the university team by a score of seven to nothing, and 2,400 of them went almost crazy with joy at the close of the game.

How the Game Was Won. The Varsity won the toss and kicked off to the Agricultural college. Adams kicked twenty yards. Captain Jardine hit the line for five yards and then a series of line plunges followed, with the two Jardines, Adams and Madson carrying the ball, and in the seventh minute of play Captain Jardine was pushed over the line after the Varsity had made a most determined brace.

Score Again in Second Half. In the second half Madson kicked off and Varsity advanced ball twenty yards. There was a fumble on the first down and Tuttle got the ball.
