

SON TESTIFIES AGAINST MOTHER

Partially Substantiates Charges of Unfaithfulness.

MRS. JONES CRIES IN COURT

HUSBAND FILES RACY ANSWER TO HER DIVORCE COMPLAINT.

Sobs that might have been indicative of shame and humiliation for the present or regret and sorrow for the past, shook Mrs. Mary A. Jones yesterday afternoon in Judge Thomas D. Lewis' courtroom after her son, W. E. Jones, had taken the witness stand against her. He swore to things which he said his mother had done which he believed had caused the charges against her to be brought against her by her father, William T. Jones, in his answer to her divorce complaint, Harry McCallin.

During the trial of the case one of the men upon whom Mrs. Jones is said to have bestowed her affections in the past, Fred W. Chaskey, who was named as co-respondent in the answer filed by Mr. Jones, took the stand and gave damaging testimony against the woman. Almost every indignity which he heard by the husband and the man now alleged to be the most favored in Mrs. Jones' eyes, Harry McCallin.

Too Intoxicated to Testify. McCloud attended the trial yesterday in such an intoxicated condition that Judge Lewis was constrained to finally place him in the custody of the sheriff to sober up. The proceedings of the case McCloud made several scenes and three times had to be taken from the presence of the court by the sheriff. When the case rested for the day at 5 o'clock, with tears coursing their way down either cheek and her body shaking with indignation, she was tempted to address the court in her own behalf, but was restrained as the case is a non-jury one and the facts are to be determined by Judge Lewis on the evidence submitted.

Mrs. Jones brought the action for divorce some weeks ago. She alleged that shortly after they were married her husband took to drinking and finally so craved the effects of stimulants that he would drink any quantity of alcohol during the course of an evening. She swore that on April 27, 1903, Mr. Jones knocked her down three times and on the next day he threw a pan of water at her. When they were living in Pocatello, Ida., Mrs. Jones avers that her husband choked her.

Wife Wants \$30 Alimony. She asked for a divorce, \$30 per month alimony and all of her husband's property. In his answer to the complaint Mr. Jones charged his wife with being untrue to him and named Chaskey as co-respondent, giving a number of dates and places. In return he asked that he be given the decreed alimony and that she be given alimony or any of her property. The case was called for trial yesterday morning and will likely occupy the attention of the court the most of today.

WANTS TO EXAMINE BOOKS. Contest Between Ogden Bank Stockholders Argued in Supreme Court. The most important of the three cases which came up yesterday in the supreme court was that of Henry O. Harkness vs. J. W. Guthrie et al., an appeal from the second judicial district. All the parties in the case are Ogden. The plaintiff is a stockholder or otherwise connected with the Commercial National bank of that city. Mr. Harkness claims that he is permitted to examine the books of the institution, which privilege, although he owns considerable stock, has been denied him up to date. In the second district court he was given a writ of mandamus on the defendants, compelling them to permit him to examine the books of the bank, but they took an appeal to the supreme court and the case was argued yesterday morning.

WRECK ON RIO GRANDE. Three Men Killed and One Fearfully Injured. Salida, Colo., Oct. 27.—The second section of a freight train of the Denver & Rio Grande road, eastbound, has been wrecked between Mears and Otto, eight miles from here. Three men were killed and one fearfully injured. The dead: Samuel Brown, engineer; Henry Simons, brakeman; John Mulcahey, brakeman. Injured: Henry Fitzsimmons, arm and leg broken. The wreck is said to have been caused by a switch at the point which made it impossible to control the train as it was descending a steep grade. The engine became detached and after tearing through Mears at the rate of sixty miles an hour, was overtaken by the cars. The collision wrecked both cars and engine.

ROOSEVELT'S BIRTHDAY. President Reached His Forty-fifth Milestone Yesterday. Washington, Oct. 27.—President Roosevelt celebrated the forty-fifth anniversary of his birth. Many beautiful and touching reminders of the event came to him from every part of the country. Hundreds of telegrams and letters of congratulation were received at the White House during the day. When the members of the cabinet assembled for the usual semi-weekly meeting, the president read their congratulatory messages to him. Among the floral offerings was a huge basket of flowers from Mrs. M. A. W. of New York. It contained specimens as large as a derby hat of a daisy and of splendid coloring.

MATRON AT FORT HALL. (Special to The Herald.) Washington, Oct. 27.—Mrs. Hattie B. Cleveland Adams of New York was today appointed matron at Fort Hall Indian school at a salary of \$700 a year.

EXPERTS DISCUSS EPIDEMICS

MEETING OF PUBLIC HEALTH ASSOCIATION.

Washington, Oct. 27.—The first regular session of the thirty-first annual meeting of the American Public Health Association was held here today. After the convention was called to order by Dr. Walter Wyman, surgeon general of the Marine hospital and public health service, General George M. Sternberg, surgeon general, U. S. A., delivered an address in which he dealt at length on the efforts which have been made to stamp out disease and to guard against epidemics. He stressed the importance of the report to remark that since it was written the present attack of yellow fever in Texas had developed, and declared he would not have believed it possible with the association's present knowledge that yellow fever could have obtained a foothold there.

Brief Married Life Iridesome. Because her husband had said in the company of others that he did not marry her because he loved her, that he hated and despised her, that "he would get rid of her even if he had to send her up on the hill, meaning the cemetery," Mittie Anderson asks for a divorce from John Anderson. The wife also alleges that her husband had made the wish that she "was in hell."

Losses a Suit of Clothes. B. Rich, in the city court some time ago, brought an action against the Wells-Fargo company to recover the value of a suit of clothes which he claimed had been lost by the company in transit. He lost the action below, and yesterday it came up to Judge Charles W. Morse in the criminal division of the district court on appeal. After hearing arguments in the case the court sustained the decision of the lower court.

Denied a New Trial. Judge Charles W. Morse, in the criminal division of the district court, yesterday overruled the motion of Christ Auer for a new trial of his action against the Salt Lake & Los Angeles Railway company. The plaintiff seeks damages for the loss of an eye and other injuries alleged to have been sustained by being pushed off a crowded Salt Lake train. The accident occurred Aug. 12, 1900. The jury returned a verdict in favor of the defendant.

District Court Notes. In the criminal division of the district court yesterday Judge Charles W. Morse admitted to citizenship Carl and Peter Odenwaller, brothers in law of Germany, but now of Salt Lake City. Emma J. Green was yesterday granted a divorce from William H. Green by Judge William C. Hall of the second judicial district. The wife was given the custody of two minor children. They were married in this city on Sept. 3, 1892. A. L. Burnham has brought suit in the district court to recover \$4,000 alleged to be due from J. M. Stout, on a promissory note executed Nov. 14, 1897. Celestine Good has filed a petition to be granted letters of administration in the matter of the estate of George Good, who died in this city on Oct. 27, 1903, leaving property worth about \$5,000.

LEVEE CONVENTION. Large and Influential Gathering at New Orleans. New Orleans, Oct. 27.—Attended with considerable ceremony, including the firing of cannon, the largest and in point of personnel the most influential levee convention yet held in the Mississippi valley opened today in the Tulane hall. President Charles Scott of the Interstate Mississippi River Improvement Levee association called the convention to order. The purpose of the meeting is to appeal to the national government for sufficient aid to levee both banks of the river and to maintain them at maximum grade, reclaiming and giving protection to the alluvial lands and improving navigation. The attendance included senators, members of congress, high railroad officials and representatives of commercial exchanges and levee boards from many states.


