Remains Taken From Stope in Bullion-Beck Mine.

(Special to The Herald.) Fruita, Nov. 21.—The body of James N. Christy, who was killed by a cave of rock in the Bullion-Beck mine, was discovered at 2 o'clock today a few feet below the surface as soon as a coroner's jury could visit the place and view the remains...

The body was bruised and mangled by rocks and timber and the features were scarcely recognizable. The shoulders were bloated and the remains badly decomposed.

Thomas Burns, justice of the peace, acting as coroner, conducted the inquest. The jury were Dan Larson, Will McNally and Frank Lovelace. The witnesses examined were Albert Marshall, Olie Baker, Richard Shaw, James Nolan, Squire Brooks, George W. Bray and Jerry Murphy...

The jury returned a verdict of accidental death and exonerated the Bullion-Beck Mining company from all blame.
