COUNTY PHYSICIAN'S REPORT. The December report of County Physician Mayo, which was yesterday filed with the board of county commissioners, shows that attended eleven cases of diphtheria and ten cases of scarlet fever. There were no cases of smallpox and four contagious diseases in quarantine at the end of the month.

PAUPER CLERK'S REPORT. During the year 1903, J. Sabin, the pauper clerk, expended \$18,926.66 in assisting the poor in the city and county. Of that sum \$2,065.50 was cash, the remainder merchandise. During the year 1902 families of 1-12 individuals, were given assistance. 2347 families received on an average of \$1.34 each person, \$2.25 of those helping 47 families, or 1553 persons, lived in the city and sixty-one families or 238 individuals, in the county. Transportation out of the city was furnished to 111 persons.

STATE BOOKS AND MONEY.

Librarian Palmer and Treasurer Dixon Report to Governor Wells.

State Treasurer J. DeGrey Dixon and State Librarian L. P. Palmer yesterday filed with Governor H. M. Wells their annual reports for 1903. The latter report shows 10,693 volumes in the library Jan. 1, as against 10,021 a year ago, an increase of 672 during 1903. He purchased 428 books at a cost of \$1,521.50, and received in exchange 156 volumes.

The report of Treasurer Dixon shows that on Dec. 31, 1902, there was a balance on hand in the state treasury of \$589,741.07, as against \$521,274.74 on the same date, 1903. The receipts last year were as follows:
