Silent Wadley, who was the favorite, was the one who stopped. Cap and Gown assumed the lead and won cleverly from Anrad and Miss Betty. The winner is owned by Dr. H. H. Howell, and his share of the stake is \$2,400.

MILES UNDER THE MINUTE

ONLY HITS THE HIGH PLACES ON FLORIDA STRAIGHTWAY

Ormond, Fla., Jan. 30.—Fifty miles with four turns in forty minutes and a record made in the Ormond-Dayton beach course today by W. K. Vanderbilt, Jr. The event was for the American Automobile association championship at this distance, open to all. The race was over twenty-five miles and over half a mile in length, and was the fastest in the world.

In this long race Mr. Vanderbilt managed to catch up with the other competitors, represented by using the ten-mile course, he displayed great skill and displayed his car in a way that has never been seen before. In his last twenty-mile race he made four feet nine inches from the starting line to the finish line, a record for every ten miles of the fifty was the best that of H. C. Bowden being second. These two records break any previous time made in America, as follows:
