

NEWS MAY KILL ROSE'S MOTHER

Sister Writes She Knows Nothing of His Crime.

THINKS BROTHER IS INSANE

WANTED MENTAL EXAMINATION HELD FIRST

Frank P. Rose's mother, who lives in Missouri, has not yet been told that her son murdered his second wife, judging from a statement made in a letter received Saturday by Attorneys Kinney & Christensen, who defended the man.

After asking the attorneys to have the date of the trial set as far ahead as possible, to enable her to assist in the securing of expert testimony to prove that her brother is insane, she says:

"The news, I fear, will be a death-blow to his invalid mother. She is evidently of the opinion that her brother is not of sound mind, for she says she cannot see the justice in a state law making a person suffer for an act for which he was not responsible."

"The sister feels it keenly that the state did not first attempt to prove her brother insane before placing him on trial for the killing of his wife, saying:

"Says Her Brother is Insane. "It must be a very strange state that can't protect an insane person, which he certainly is. I know his disposition well enough to know he would be deeply affected if he was at himself."

When asked yesterday if any of the members of his family were coming out to see him, Rose said no, adding:

"You see, it is a pretty long distance, and they are not really prepared to make the journey. And then there is really no need of it. I am all right as I am. There would be nothing gained by it, and I do not want to cause them any more sorrow."

Rose asked what was done Saturday with his boy. When informed that the matter of guardianship would not be settled for about a week yet, he seemed surprised. He was laboring under the impression that Elmer had already been turned over to Miss Katherine Page.

When told that the delay was merely a legal formality to give Mrs. V. R. Stiekney an opportunity to reply to the requests of Miss Page, Rose said:

"Don't see why the courts should interfere with a man giving his child to any one he sees fit. Seems to me there has been enough legal delays in this family to suit most any one. I don't regret, and was patiently waiting for Friday, April 23, when he will begin that eternal rest for which he longs."
