

PROPHET UNABLE TO HELP HIMSELF

Fails to See Consequences if He Breaks Laws.

BEATS A HASTY RETREAT

FORTUNE TELLING POWERS ARE PASSED ALONG.

A distinguished looking individual walked into the office of Assistant City Attorney William H. Bramel in the city and county building yesterday and asked permission to rent a room in the city where he could tell the future of men, women or children. He said he was a prophet.

Not in the least awed by the man's domineering the assistant city attorney informed him that he would first have to take out a fortune teller's license, which would cost him \$200 per year, or \$50 per quarter.

"But I am not a fortune teller," replied the man, with an indignant air, drawing himself to the most imposing position at his command. "I am a prophet. I am an endowed with the future of every person in the city."

Can't Tell His Own Future. Mr. Bramel told the man it made no difference whether he was a prophet or fortune teller, he would first have to get the coin just the same. It would be an infraction of the law if he practiced his profession without the proper authority.

"Suppose I should rent a room and prophesy to people who might come to me, what would the authorities do with me," asked the man.

"If you are a prophet," said Mr. Bramel, "why should you ask me such a question? I should imagine that you would be able to answer that for yourself if you can tell other people what is going to happen to them. It is a poor rule that will not work both ways."

The man stalked out of the office without continuing the conversation.

The other day a woman called upon Mr. Bramel and asked for a fortune telling license. She was directed to the city treasurer's office, where she was informed that the license would cost her \$200 a year, or \$50 a quarter. She was surprised at the figure, saying she could not pay more than a dollar or two a week.

Nevertheless the woman paid \$5 for the privilege, and left the building yesterday morning the husband of the woman called upon Mr. Bramel and asked for the return of the money, saying that his "woman" was sick and could not tell fortunes. When informed that the city council was the only power through which he could get the money, the man left the office disgraced.

An hour or so later a son of the Gypsy asked to have the license transferred to his name, that he might tell fortunes while peddling "rocks" through the city. He became angry when told that it could not be done. That was the last seen of him.

WILDLY BEGS CLOTHES

George S. Smith, Jr., Rushes Into Hotel Lobbies—Picked Up, Out of His Mind.

Costless and hatless and laboring under the delusion that some one was about to do him harm, George S. Smith, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. George S. Smith of 143 East Sixth South street, forced his way into the Knutsford hotel at an early hour yesterday morning and, after affrighting the few occupants of the lounging room, made loud demands for "more clothes."

Before he could enforce his demands or do any harm he was arrested by Charles McElrath, sergeant-at-law. At the station he was charged with battery upon the person of his father, George S. Smith, Sr. No assault had been committed, and the charge was merely in the nature of a technical one, preferred for the purpose of holding the apparently insane man all night.

Yesterday the charge was dropped and he was allowed to return to his parents' home, where he is now under medical treatment.

When taken in custody by Officer Perry, Smith seemed dazed. He was able to comprehend, however, the predicament which he was in, and made slight resistance to his arrest. He made no attempt to account for his strange actions other than he "wanted a coat and hat."

Subsequently it developed that Smith had escaped from the city hall, 143 East Sixth South street, earlier in the afternoon and had been sent home by friends who found him wandering about the streets, shivering throughly one-half past midnight.

First he visited the Ford hotel, where, scantily clothed, he made the same peculiar request as he subsequently made at the Knutsford. As soon as Smith's people learned of his escape they dispatched Mr. McElrath in pursuit. It was in the Knutsford that the latter located his deluded relative and secured his arrest.

Smith, Jr., according to relatives and friends, has on several previous occasions had similar attacks.

University of Utah Students to Make Application.

PLAN A CHAPTER HOUSE

SEEK TO INTRODUCE THIS PHASE OF COLLEGE LIFE.

At the last regular meeting of the "A. F. Frat" at the University of Utah yesterday it was decided to apply for a charter in the Delta Upsilon fraternity. A committee was appointed for this purpose. Steps were also taken looking toward the erection of a fraternity house.

The "A. F. Frat" is an organization for some time and has shown considerable strength. This is the first attempt by any college organization in Utah to get a chapter in a Greek letter fraternity.

The Delta Upsilon Fraternity. It has many chapters scattered over the east, but as yet only a few western colleges have been granted charters.

The local "Frat" also elected new officers at its meeting last night. They were chosen as follows: Oscar Carlson, president; Dell B. Judd, vice president; Elton Jensen, secretary; Harold Hill, treasurer; Marion Eardley, D. Alexander and Karl Hopkins, executive committee.

A provision for building a fraternity house was considered and a committee was appointed to see what was the best plan. It was generally agreed that the best way would be for some real estate agent to build a house and rent it to the fraternity, which would plan in due time to pay for it.

The faculty of the university is encouraging the fraternity movement.

A SUSPICIOUS DEATH

Circumstances Point to Poisoning, Probably Self-Administered.

Richfield, May 20.—County Attorney H. N. Hayes was called to Salina yesterday to investigate the death of Mrs. Al Blood, which occurred the previous evening at her home at Lone Creek, near Suspicious circumstances. The only person who knows anything about the case is her husband, and he says that she was assisting him in planting some garden seeds she suddenly complained of being quite ill and said she believed she had swallowed some strychnine. Mr. Blood immediately carried her to the house and gave her a quantity of brandy, but the woman grew worse and was soon seized with convulsions. Mr. Blood then hastened to a neighbor about two miles away and when they returned the woman was dead.

When the news reached Salina there were many rumors started in circulation. Dr. Wray was called to the scene and a description of the effects of the woman's illness came to the conclusion that she had taken strychnine, but it has not yet been determined whether accidentally or with suicidal intent. It is believed the latter is the case. There is no known cause for the act, except that her mind may have become temporarily affected. Her husband said she believed she had swallowed some strychnine. Mr. Blood immediately carried her to the house and gave her a quantity of brandy, but the woman grew worse and was soon seized with convulsions.
