THINKS COUNCIL NEEDS PRAYERS

William Husbands Wants to Go to St. Louis as Chaplain.

GUARANTEES SATISFACTION

BRIGHAM STREET PAVING ORDINANCE PASSED.

William Husbands thinks it is not safe to permit the members of the city council to go to St. Louis without a spiritual adviser and has asked permission to become a member of the councilmanic party which leaves Salt Lake for the exposition city this afternoon of July 1. He promises that his supplications as chaplain will be strictly orthodox, with the guarantee that neither Democrats or Republicans will be offended by what he might say. The communication, which reads as follows, was received and filed:

"I hereby make application for position as chaplain to accompany your honorable body to St. Louis, etc. Having great regard for your welfare in all matters, especially spiritual, I think you should have some one with you to look after your interest in this direction.

"My supplications shall be strictly orthodox and I guarantee my utterances shall be non-partisan in character so that neither Republican or Democrat could take any exceptions, and in consequence will ever be effective and certainly of great benefit to the honorable council. Brigham Street to be Paved.

One of the last acts of the council before it took a recess Thursday evening at 7:30 o'clock was to pass an ordinance providing for the paving of Brigham street from State street to the west side of Seventh East street. The ordinance was passed in conjunction with a resolution to the effect that when that portion of the thoroughfare is improved that the remainder of it shall be paved.

The improvement originally contemplated paving as far east as Tenth East street. It was amended to extend only as far as Seventh East street because it is expected it will take two years for the contractor to get that far, and in the interim the people living between Tenth and Seventh street would have paid out money for a benefit which they would not be receiving. To placate them it was decided to improve part of the street at a time.

A resolution was introduced by Councilman A. J. Davis and passed, voting an appropriation of \$2,000 for water main connections on M street, which will give the extreme northeastern section of the city water connections. Councilman E. H. Davis secured the passage of a resolution providing for the grading and surfacing of East Temple street, including the sidewalks, from First street to Second North street. The contract is given to Joseph W. Mehen.

MAY BUILD A NEW ZION.

Highland Falls, N. Y., June 27.—John A. Dowie of Zion City, Ills., came here in a special train from New York today and, according to report, purchased some land near Fort Montgomery for the establishment of a new Zion City. Dowie was accompanied by some officials of the West Shore railroad and several other gentlemen. After viewing the property the party returned to New York.

COST OF WORLD'S FAIR.

St. Louis, June 27.—The national commission for the World's fair tonight forwarded to President Roosevelt and the treasury department the monthly financial statement of the exposition company for April. It shows that the balance on hand March 31 was \$1,847,657. On April 30 the amount on hand was \$1,451,577. The total receipts to April 29 were \$15,178, and the total disbursements were \$13,727,042.

ELEVATOR STRIKE IS OFF. Boston, June 27.—Two hundred members of the local branch of the International Elevator Constructors' union, who have been on strike for several weeks to secure recognition, working arrangement, returned to work today, a satisfactory agreement with the employers having been reached.

LIQUOR ON THE YUKON. Vancouver, B. C., June 27.—An order in council has been passed giving power to the Yukon council to deal with the liquor business in the Yukon territory. The Yukon council had been doing this under a local ordinance, when objections were taken to it on grounds of want of jurisdiction. The justice department held that the objections taken were valid, and now the Dominion government has passed this order to dispose of the question of divided authority. This new order contains the same provision as the old order, that is, spirits will be admitted at \$2 per gallon and beer and light wines at 50 cents.

PIERCE FIGHT IN THIBET. Gyantse, Thibet, June 27.—General MacDonald with reinforcements entered Gyantse June 26, after a somewhat severe fight with the Thibetians at the Naini monastery, six miles distant. The monastery was strongly held by the Thibetians, who were driven out only after four hours of artillery, infantry and hand-to-hand fighting.

The British force lost five men killed and six wounded. The Thibetan loss was considerable, but the estimated numbers were not given out.
