LABORERS BANKRUPT.—Arthur T. and Harrison S. Shurtlett, laborers living near Calder's park, have filed a petition in bankruptcy. The firm's liabilities are \$26,817, and the assets are \$25,000.

HOLDING ALLEGED MURDERER.—Jim Daly, alias Daly, whose record the local authorities are now investigating with a view towards fixing on him guilt for the murder of a Los Angeles policeman, was sentenced yesterday afternoon to fifteen days for vagrancy.

WATSON S. PIERCE DEAD.—Watson S. Pierce died yesterday at the age of 80, after a brief illness. He was buried yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from O'Donnell's undertaking parlors. Deceased had been a resident of Salt Lake City for twenty years.

LOUIS PERME BURIED.—Louis Perme, who was murdered at Bingham Junction earlier in the week by Frank and Jerry Nuech, was buried yesterday in Calvary cemetery by Undertaker E. W. Hall. The friends of the murdered man raised a subscription sufficient to save him from the paupers' field. It was reported yesterday that Sheriff Cronin of Euroeka, Wash., had captured the Nuech brothers. An investigation proved that the report was not correct.

SHES FOR BIG DAMAGES.—Marion Leobourer yesterday brought suit in district court against the street car company to recover \$100 for personal injuries received the afternoon of June 8 on State street, between Fifth and Sixth south streets. At the time of the accident she was riding on a trolley in which Mr. Leobourer was riding, throwing him out, breaking and crushing three of his ribs, dislocating the vertebrae and fracturing the horse. He lays the blame for the accident upon the motorman, whom he claims did not ring his gong.

"BAD EYE" NOT GUILTY.—A "ragtime" session of the city police court was held yesterday, a half dozen colored gentry figuring in the proceedings. The occasion was the hearing of "Bad Eye" Jackson on a charge of trespass. Mr. Jackson's friends turned out in force to protest against his going behind the barred door on such a charge.
