Russian Explanation of Smolensk Affair.

PROTEST OF GREAT BRITAIN

FORMAL REPLY HAS NOT BEEN RECEIVED.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 25.—Great Britain has formally called the attention of the Russian government to the renewed activity of the volunteer steamer Smolensk and has asked for explanations. Russia has not yet formally replied, being without official information, but in a general way she has explained with the foreign office suggested to the Associated Press yesterday.

Orders sent to the Smolensk not to stop any neutral vessels have not been delivered.

The Novoe Vremya, commenting on the English newspaper's proposition to treat the Russian auxiliary cruisers as pirates, asks them not to forget Premier Dalfour's remarks that the neutrals of today are the belligerents of tomorrow, and inquires how the British auxiliary cruisers would relish being treated as pirates.

GUARDS HAVING PLEASANT TIME

Surroundings at Camp Blackhawk Very Desirable.

MILITIA SHOWS PROFICIENCY

WORK PRAISED BY REGULAR ARMY OFFICERS.

(Special to The Herald.) Camp Black Hawk, Aug. 25.—The guardsmen are enjoying the pleasant surroundings of the camp, such as fishing, boating and bathing, and the dance in the pavilion in the evening. The only trouble about this is that there is not enough time given the boys to attend to these matters. They are kept pretty busy attending to the various military duties incident to the encampment, and as that is what they came for, there can be no objection.

In this connection it may be stated that Lieutenant Haskell, U. S. A., who is delivering a course of lectures on military matters, speaks very highly of the efficiency of the men, especially of their intelligence and the ease with which they grasp the subjects presented. This evening he lectured on patrol duty and the selection of camp sites.

Looking for the Governor. This may be useful if the guards make their practice march tomorrow. If Governor Wells comes down in the morning the practice march will probably be taken, and the governor will review the troops. If he comes in the afternoon the practice march will be taken in the forenoon. The governor's presence is still a matter of uncertainty, and it will not be known until the officers, it does not seem probable from the viewpoint of a layman that he can conveniently come.

This uncertainty, however, does not prevent the officers from going ahead with the duties of the encampment. In fact, the governor has instructed General Cannon to go ahead as if there were no governor, but, of course, the general desires to receive the commander in chief in a suitable manner if he comes. If the governor does not come and Adjutant General Burton comes the brigade will be reviewed by him, and if he does not come, by General Cannon.

Morning Drill. This morning a fine drill was given in advance and rear guard and outpost duties, including battery practice, following a lecture by Captain Jamerson on the subject of delivery of last evening. The artillerymen were highly complimented by the officers on their fine work. The horses, with which there has been some difficulty, are also catching on to their part of the programme, which assists in making the work go smoothly. A rather novel feature of the drill is the use of the sound of travel from the time the smoke was seen from the cannon in the field east of the camp. The distance is about three-quarters of a mile and the sound of travel is heard in the second after the smoke was visible. The battery is also coming in for some very complimentary comments for its fine target practice.

Signal Corps Practice. The signal corps also gave a successful drill in telegraphing this morning. The signal corps has had a fine count of cloudy weather in the past. The squads were in charge of Sergeants Walsh and Manning. Captain Smith of the signal corps takes a great deal of pride in his department, and he is greatly pleased to think that next year the encampment will have a complete electric service.

The officer of the day today is First Lieutenant Jensen of company F, Manning and the officer of the guard, Lieutenant H. D. Wells, company B, Ogden.

For the next encampment Lieutenant Colonel Green will offer two gold medals as prizes. The first for the best drilled sergeant, extended order of a section, and the second for the best drilled corporal, extended order of a squad.

At retreat parade this evening General Cannon will review the guards.

Three Men in Hospital. There are three men in the hospital. Gustavson of troop A, who became ill while on drill this morning, and was compelled to fall out. He fell to the ground and was brought in on a stretcher and given prompt attention by the hospital corps. His indisposition is supposed to have been caused by overexertion, but is not serious.

Sergeant Rogers of troop A and Private Jensen of company F are indisposed by influenza attacks.

Lieutenant Green, U. S. A., is not enjoying himself nearly as well as he expected. He claims the trouble is all caused by his fall, but the complaint which appeared in The Herald.

Mrs. Smith, wife of Captain Smith of the signal corps, is a visitor at the camp today.

Officers Entertained. The Provo Commercial club will entertain the officers of the encampment at a grand ball every day. The ball this evening. Invitations were brought to camp today by President Irvine and a committee of the club. The officers are contemplating giving a ball tomorrow evening.

While there are many visitors to camp this year the visitors are not so numerous as last year. This is not because the boys are not popular, but there is apparently less freedom granted the men and therefore less time for socializing.

The flag pole in front of General Cannon's tent was knocked down and broken last evening by a runaway team, and has been replaced. It was necessary to have a board of survey called to pass upon the damages to the pole. A young officer to whom General Cannon was explaining the matter appeared rather to be of the opinion as a layman would be, that it would be cheaper to pay for the repairs to the pole without any red tape of kind, although he had not said so, but it was explained that the board of survey was the proper military caper.

General Cannon is a great favorite with officers and men for his pleasing manners, his interest in the boys and his strict supervision and thoroughness.
