Services at Synagogue in Honor of Rosh-Hashono.

WORSHIPPERS TO REPENT

QUAINT HEBRAIC CUSTOMS STILL REMAIN.

Today is the Jewish New Year day, "Rosh-Hashono," as it is called in Hebrew, which, being translated, means "the beginning of the year."

The day commences at sundown on Friday and continues until sundown on Saturday in the liberal church. In the orthodox church the ceremonies last ten days. The ecclesiastical year commences in the seventh month of the lunar or holistic year.

The day is given up to thinking over the past year and making resolves for the year to come. At the synagogue last evening solemn religious exercises were held. The service consisted of reading of penitential passages from the Bible and singing of hymns which are intended to bring ideas of repentance to the mind of the worshipper.

This morning at 10 o'clock the scrolls of the law are taken out and appropriate passages read. The "shofar," or ram's horn, is blown. The shofar was used by Moses during the journey of the children of Israel from the Sinai to the tabernacle to worship.

The blowing of the shofar is called a "service of repentance." In the orthodox church the blowing of the shofar is a white robe during this service. The robe is symbolic of death and intended to bring into the mind the shortness of human life and its infirmities.

The Jewish New Year is observed, in accordance with this injunction: "And in the seventh month on the first day of the month shall ye have a holy convocation; no service work shall ye do; a day of blowing the shofar shall it be unto you." Numbers 29:1.

The cornet mentioned in the Bible is the ram's horn, or "shofar," and is used in all Jewish synagogues on the New Year. In the orthodox synagogue the man who has this duty must not have shaved his beard. He must not have committed any offense which would bar him from this sacred office. If he has done such a trivial thing as smoking a cigar on the Sabbath, he would be barred.

When he is ready to blow the "shofar," he covers his head with the "talith," a silk cloth, and stands with his hands at the altar, beside the rabbi, and at certain places in the ceremony blows the solemn sounds. The congregation does not look away from him when the "shofar" is blown. This would be considered a sin. The man himself is covered that his face cannot be seen. Only his hand holding the ram's horn is left uncovered.

But the man whose duty it is to blow the "shofar" is not reformed temple stand beside the rabbi, who stands beside the congregation looks forward earnestly to the blowing of the ram's horn. In the orthodox synagogue the "shofar" is blown about thirty times, whereas it is blown but three times in the reformed.

In the orthodox church the rabbi must not shave his beard; he stands with a cap on his head and a "talith" on his shoulders, similar to the one covering the head of the "shofar" blower. In the picture, in the reformed synagogue the rabbi stands with uncovered head, as is any other minister of the gospel. The "shofar" blower has to sit on hard benches in the orthodox synagogue, while in the up-to-date reformed synagogue the benches are upholstered seats, similar to those in theatres, are used.

According to the Hebrew calendar the year 5665 has just elapsed. In the old days a week before New Year's the chosen people were sent to repair to the miynan before sunrise for the purpose of prayer. The miynan, this term was known as the Selichoth days, "Rosh-Hashono" begins the real holiday season which continues until the Day of Atonement.

At the synagogue this morning Rabbi Louis G. Reynolds will preach a sermon on the significance of New Year's Day.

MONSTER BONES FOUND IN ROCKS

Surveyor Reports Great Discovery in Colorado.

BRINGS SPECIMENS TO CITY

ALFRED R. TALAMANTES FINDS DINOSAUR BONES.

Alfred R. Talamantes, a mining and civil engineer with offices in the Commercial building, has returned to this city with an interesting tale of discovery by himself of a great dinosaur bone in the western part of Colorado. In support of his story he exhibits specimens of a petrified substance which is undoubtedly the bone of an animal of tremendous stature.

Talamantes has been employed for months in the survey of the roadbed of the new Utah railroad. His work has carried him into the wildest and least explored parts of the state, and he has been very much interested in the geological character of the country. While engaged in the inspection of a quartz ledge one day, he noticed nearby a peculiar formation of the ground. Close investigation revealed the presence of an immense bed of petrified bones. It lay for rods along the ground, and the largest pieces imbedded in the rock and brought to this city with him, is plainly a section of the jaw-bone of an animal having a huge head. The roots of the animal's teeth are apparent, imbedded in the bone at intervals of one inch each. According to the engineer, the remaining portions of the skeleton are revealed in the formation of the rocky bed, and it is possible to lodge them and wire them together, the skeleton of a massive dinosaur will be obtained.

Talamantes has brought with him to this city a party of scientists to investigate the bones. He says the place he does not say. He says the locality is in the western part of Colorado near the route of the new road. If investigation should reveal the bones to be as large as he expects, Mr. Talamantes' discovery is an important one. At present the only large dinosaur bed known in the world is in Wyoming, at a place called "Bone Cabin Quarry," not far from the Medicine Bow river. It was discovered by William D. Peck in 1858.
