KENTUCKY. Returns Indicate a Majority For Parker and Davis of 15,000.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 8.—With one-third of the precincts reported at 1 o'clock the vote indicates a majority for Parker of from 12,000 to 14,000. The figures of the Democratic and Republican managers show little variance from this result. The election was peaceful and outside of Louisville a light vote was cast.

PENNSYLVANIA. Roosevelt's Majority May Run Up to Half a Million.

Philadelphia, Nov. 8.—Roosevelt's plurality in Pennsylvania far exceeds the expectations of the Republican managers. There is a heavy falling off in the Democratic vote all over the state. The Republicans have elected twenty-nine of the thirty-two congressmen. The legislature is overwhelmingly Republican.

ILLINOIS. Roosevelt and Fairbanks Will Have Over 200,000.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—According to the returns received at midnight, Illinois will give President Roosevelt the largest plurality ever given to any presidential candidate. He had by the unofficial returns carried Chicago by 57,000, and the county of Cook outside of the city by about 3,000 additional, making his plurality in the county not far from 107,000.

KANSAS. Clean Sweep Even to the Embezzling State Treasurer.

TENNESSEE. Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 8.—It is practically certain that the state will give back a majority of 2,000, while Peabody (Dem.) is elected governor by from 12,000

WISCONSIN. Roosevelt by 6,000—State Ticket is in Doubt.

Milwaukee, Nov. 8.—It is generally conceded that Roosevelt has carried Wisconsin by 6,000. Both Republican and Democratic state chairmen claim the state respectively for La Follette and Peck. Republican Chairman Connor at 11 o'clock said: "From returns received I figure that La Follette's plurality for governor is 20,000. In some districts our ticket ran ahead of expectations and in others behind. We have nothing to indicate the complexion of the next legislature."

OHIO. Columbus, O., Nov. 8.—The returns from different cities and counties tonight indicate that the Republicans have broken all their records in Ohio. Their highest plurality was 17,000, in 1884. At midnight Chairman Dick put the Republican plurality largely in excess of 150,000.

VERMONT. White River Junction, Vt., Nov. 8.—Roosevelt carried Vermont today by about 21,000. He ran ahead of McKinley's vote in 1900, while Parker ran behind that of Bryan. The only question at issue was the choice of presidential electors.

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Eight Democrats have been elected to congress, leaving the delegation in the hands of the Republicans. The election of William B. Bates to the United States senate is certain.

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The Republicans claim a net gain of at least one congressman, Taylor, in the Twelfth district. Chairman Garner of the Democratic state committee also claims a net gain of one congressman, congressman. The Ohio delegation in congress now stands seventeen Republicans and four Democrats.

Only twelve of twenty-one counties are represented in the returns so far. Plurality of 2,500 for Roosevelt seems to be indicated by returns at hand, and 15,000 for Coalinga.
