

CREDITORS WILL GET 100 CENTS

Schettler Tells About Conditions of His Bank. SMALL DEPOSITORS UNEASY RECEIVER WILL REPORT TO THE COURT NEXT WEEK.

Early next week Robert R. Anderson, the receiver for the defunct bank of B. H. Schettler, will make his report to the district court, setting forth the conditions of the business of the institution and giving as far as possible the assets and liabilities. This report is expected to relieve the anxieties of a large number of small depositors whose savings for many years were in the bank when the doors were closed.

Reasons For Transfers. Mr. Schettler was asked to explain why it is necessary to transfer the real estate at this time. These transfers have been causing uneasiness among the depositors of the bank.

Saves His Home. The family homestead on Brigham street, Mr. Schettler said, is not involved in the failure, and that much will be saved.

An Ordinance. AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR the election of a sewer system for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of Salt Lake City, Utah.

Section 1. That there is an immediate and pressing necessity for increasing the water supply of Salt Lake City, Utah.

Section 2. That to increase said water supply it is hereby ordered that a bonded indebtedness to the amount of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars be incurred.

Section 3. That to establish and provide sewer mains and a sewer system for said city above specified calls for and requires an expenditure of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

Section 4. That in pursuance of section 2 of this ordinance, the city recorder of Salt Lake City, Utah, on the 24th day of January, 1905, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of Salt Lake City, Utah.
