KETCHUM'S SKIRTS CLEARED

OWNER OF STALLION MANAGES TO SHIFT RESPONSIBILITY

Chicago, Dec. 8.—George H. Ketchum of Toledo was found not guilty of establishing a fraudulent record for a stallion named Cresceus at the Wichita, Kansas, track on October 1, 1934, after a hearing before the board of directors of the American Trotting association here tonight.

The board declared that the evidence fell short of sufficiency in establishing criminal participation in the fraudulent record for the horse.

It was detailed by Starter Jordan of the Wichita track who declared to the board that he had been found by the world's mile record would be broken if the record was made without considerable cooperation in matters of minor detail.

While freeing Mr. Ketchum from the charge, the board also cleared the Southern Kansas Fair association, on whose track the race was run, guilty of complicity in the fraud.

Coat of Whiteness For Ketchum.

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Persons on the board beside Mr. Irwin were S. B. Amidon, judge; A. C. Jordan, Fred Stearnes and H. J. James, all of whom were found by the board to have participated in the announcement and establishment of the fraudulent record of the horse Cresceus.

The expansion of these officials also means that the American Trotting association of 1934, claimed to have been made by Cresceus, is not allowed by the board.

Gross Fraud on Public.

In the decision on the case the board says in part: "Leaving out of consideration only the fact that the name of Mr. Jordan, detailing what he now claims to be the truth about the transaction, so far as at least as the statements made therein affect any person other than himself, and relying on the contradictory statements under oath made by Messrs. Amidon, Stearnes, Jordan, James and Irwin, not only as to the time made and the details of the performance, but also and particularly as to the fact that effort shown to establish what must have been known by Messrs. Irwin and Amidon at an absolutely correct time, and in a meeting for the record purpose, we are forced to the unavoidable conclusion that each of the persons named herein was a little more than a year made absolutely responsible for the fraudulent record of the horse Cresceus, inasmuch as the essential facts necessary to establish the regularity of the meeting, and even the announcement of the time made, from the several affidavits the conclusion is inescapable that not only was the meeting irregular, but an attempt to give the horse such a record was made in gross violation of the American Trotting association.

Cresceus Did Not Make Time.

"All controversy as to the regularity of the performance and the correctness of the time claimed is forever set at rest by the fact that the horse named herein, through his attorney today, made before the board in which he unequivocally admitted that he had never made the time claimed for the horse Cresceus, and that he is not entitled to the record for the performance of any record arising therefrom, and that the record for the horse named herein was made by the American Trotting association.

AMERICAN LEAGUE MEETING.

Proposed Agreement as to Drafting Players Turned Down.

The clause in the national agreement which benefits minor leagues by raising the price of drafted players from \$25 to \$125 and limiting the number of players to be drafted from one club to one man was turned down by the authorized to act for the American league in conjunction with the National league representatives and Chairman Herrmann of the national commission to frame a national agreement eliminating this clause.
