WHITECAPS' WARNING Send an Anonymous Threatening Letter to Aged Provo Citizen.

Provo, Dec. 10.—Emil Osterloh, an old man about eighty years of age, who runs a one-horse express wagon in this city, has received an anonymous letter, mailed in Salt Lake City and bearing a Salt Lake date line. The letter informs him that members of "our organization" have reported that he is in the habit of getting around at being disgraced to his wife, and that one of the members had followed him home one night and heard him demand that he be "whitcapped" and a division of the property "right away." The letter further informs the old gentleman that he does not intend his ways will be "whitcapped," and is signed "The First Eye Opener."

WOMAN FACES BANDIT'S Holdups Rob Jensen's Grocery and Point Gun at Mrs. Jensen During Robbery.

Two masked men robbed the grocery store of A. B. Jensen, 2304 Washington street, about 8 o'clock last night, compelling Mrs. Jensen, who was alone in the store, to move away from the till and allow them to rifle it. They kept a revolver pointed at her head all the time. Earlier in the evening a 13-year-old girl was left in charge of the store for a little while, and she remembers someone looking in through the window. About 3 o'clock Mrs. Jensen, wife of the proprietor, moved away from the till and preparing to take the money home with her. The two fellows entered the front door, and before leaving one of them pointed the weapon in her face and made her move back. The other went behind the counter, opened the till and took the contents, which included a check for \$35 and about \$15 in money. The check was not indorsed before leaving one of the fellows grabbed the receiver of the telephone and wrenched it off, so as to delay the sending of a message.

KNOCKED DOWN BY HORSE. Mrs. George Stoddard Injured by a Runaway Animal.

Mrs. George Stoddard was knocked down and painfully injured yesterday afternoon by a runaway horse at the intersection of Washington avenue and Twenty-fifth street. The horse belonged to the driver of the team, who lent an employee of Fred J. Kiesel to take up his home on the bench. The borrower did not get the animal, but slipped off while he went in to eat. The horse soon started to run away and struck Mrs. Stoddard, who was walking down by the swinging shafts, her head striking the pavement with such force as to bruise her forehead. Her arms and nose, Dr. Rich states that her hurts are not serious.
