
D. N. Straup withdraws from the law firm of Powers & Straup on the 1st of January, 1905, to assume the duties of justice of the supreme court.

QUEER LOCOMOTIVE TO DEVELOP HIGH SPEED

Southern Pacific Will Try Internal-Combustion Engine that is Expected to Run 120 Miles an Hour at Half the Cost of Present Type.

Local railroad men are watching with interest for the advent of the new internal combustion locomotive which the Southern Pacific company expects to install in the near future. Crude oil is used for fuel to operate the engines, which in turn furnish the power for dynamos that generate the electricity that runs the motor that drives the wheels.

almost all of it is used. On an ordinary steam engine but 4 1/2 per cent of the energy produced by the consumption of the coal goes under the boiler, the rest goes up the smoke stack. In the new locomotive four times as much of the energy is used as in the ordinary engine.

Hereofore stationary engines are the only ones that have been made on the internal combustion plan. The locomotive now being constructed for the Southern Pacific is the only one of its kind. The builders say it is better than a trolley car equipped with high speed trolley wheels.
