

FOR ONE SPENT ON FOOTBALL

Coaches Are an Expensive Part of the Game.

BETTER PAID THAN "PROFS" GOOD MEN CAN DEMAND THEIR OWN PRICE.

Football coaches have become captains of industry during the last few years, according to a number of contracts promulgated by different colleges of late.

It is this phase of high paid professional coaching which has attracted the university authorities, and the question has been raised whether it is all going to pay.

Greek and Latin Come Easy. While the budding professors of antiquity, economy, geology, history, Greek, Latin and other studies usually draw from \$2,000 to \$7,000 for nine months' work at the university, the football coaches at Michigan, Northwestern, Chicago, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Harvard, Yale, Princeton and other colleges are paid from \$10,000 to \$15,000 a year.

Others Are Well Paid. Going down the line there are other coaches just as well paid as Yost and Reid. Nothing has been given out how much Yale pays its athletic coaches, but it has been common report for years that prominent players have been called to the university for \$10,000 each for six days' hustling on the gridiron.
