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WHY LOS ANGELES WINS.

WHEN ONE SEES how the Los Angeles people advertise, he can understand why that city and all its neighbors prosper and grow amazingly.

The Herald yesterday received from E. J. Gillett, general passenger agent of the San Pedro railway, a small box of Sunny Mountain oranges from the Sunny Mountain ranch at Riverside.

It is safe to say that every man, woman and child who makes the trip and gets the souvenir is a pampering promoter for California and the San Pedro. Every one of them will write home and tell of the trip and the attention shown the tourists, and every one of them will talk about it for a long while to come.

The moral is very plain. What California has done Utah could do in her own way quite as effectively if she would.

THE STATEHOOD FIGHT. AS THE SITUATION presents itself now, the friends of Arizona have scored a distinct triumph in preventing the absorption of the territory by a state with New Mexico as Senator Beveridge had planned.

Arizona had, very properly, declared in favor of remaining outside the sisterhood of states rather than be slung into an obnoxious combination, but in spite of her stated position, Beveridge had determined to drag her into the acceptance of his ultimatum.

It is his great credit that Senator Kearns secured the adoption by the senate of an amendment giving Utah what is known as the Arizona strip, the territory lying between the Utah line and the Colorado river.

From Kanab in Utah to the edge of the Grand Canon it is close to a hundred miles in distance, the drive being across an arid desert until the base of the mountains is reached; from the foothills onward, the trail is through a most beautiful region up to the top of a plateau about 5,000 feet in elevation, well timbered, with a few little lakes and springs for water supply.

Our worst suspicions have been confirmed. At the joint session of the houses of congress yesterday it was discovered that Theodore Roosevelt and Charles W. Fairbanks have really been elected president and vice president respectively for the term of four years beginning on the fourth day of next month.

DANGER AT HOME.

A NEW YORKER with a head for figures has just turned out a statement of the accidents in that city during the last forty-one years.

Twenty-four per cent of them occurred while the victims were walking along the streets, eighteen per cent were due to horses and vehicles, five per cent to railroad travel, three per cent to street car travel, two per cent to the use of firearms, one per cent to assaults, two per cent to animal bites, three-fourths of one per cent to steamship travel and six per cent to recreation.

We believe the same rule will hold good throughout the country. If you consider the matter for a moment yourself, you will find that you hear of more accidents in houses than anywhere else. Most of them are, it is true, of a minor character, but they help prodigiously in swelling the total.

If your policy is up-to-date it contains a clause which doubles the face value of the policy in the event that you are killed or injured while riding on a street car or other public conveyance, on a railroad train, in a passenger elevator or in several other ways that seem, to the uninitiated, to invite accidents.

IN THE DEATH OF Joseph H. Manley at his home in Augusta, Maine, on Tuesday there passed away a man whose life career shows how we make our entrances and our exits on the stage of life; how soon, having played our parts, we are forgotten.

It was largely through Mr. Manley's influence and efforts that James G. Blaine was nominated for the presidency in 1884. Mr. Manley was for Blaine again in the memorable convention in Minneapolis in 1892, when Blaine resigned from Harrison's cabinet in order to run against his chief for the presidential nomination.

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AN UNWISE RESOLUTION. IF THE OREGON state senate were a United States court with power to try Senator John H. Mitchell for alleged misconduct in office, the senator would doubtless pass triumphantly out from under the cloud that now hangs over him.

Senator Mitchell has been indicted two or three times over for an alleged connection with some timber land frauds in Oregon. The grand jury that heard the testimony against him considered it strong enough to warrant conviction. Otherwise it is certain the indictments would have been returned.
