

HOUSE TALKS AT DOLLAR A MINUTE

Expenses of the Legislature Are Running High.

SALARIES THUS FAR \$13,440

Utah is paying \$384 every day of the sixth session of the legislature for salaries of senators, representatives and attaches of both houses.

At this the thirty-third session, it has cost the state to date thirty-five times \$384, or \$13,440. Sabbaths, of course, cost as session days, for it's no one's fault but the Lord's that sessions are not held Sundays—but then, these Saturdays, too. However, some say that it's really better for the state that the lawmakers take a whack at the existing rules and regulations governing the session laws only five days out of the seven.

The result of two assiduous applications, they say, would be dire. So much for the state's debit account.

Work So Far Accomplished.

Now for the credit side of the ledger: A resume of the legislature's work since the first day of the session, Monday, Jan. 9, discloses considerable value received—in the abstract.

In the first place the session has been productive of an official message which competent critics declare better than that of any other governor, save one of this state, who needs caution, though, in figuring where credit leaves off and debit begins in this case, as the aforesaid message had to be printed. In that respect, copies were made. These cost "some."

Early in the session also the legislature decided to deal with the national senate all right and chain to George Sutherland. This may be placed on the credit side, pro tem.

Numbered with these two conservative risks must be bills which both branches of the legislature have passed on favorably. Up to date seven house and three senate bills have been enacted into law. There are also six senate bills which have been acted on favorably by that body and are awaiting action of the house. While there are eleven house bills which are in the same predicament with regard to disposition on the part of the senate. However, the house has passed both houses, and the same is true of house concurrent resolutions 1 and 2.

The seven house bills which have thus far run the gantlet are H. B. No. 44, by Kinney; H. B. No. 45, by Kinney; H. B. No. 48, by Kinney; H. B. No. 49, by Kinney; H. B. No. 50, by Kuehler; H. B. No. 51, by Kinney; H. B. No. 52, by Kinney.

The three senate bills are S. B. No. 1, by McKim; S. B. No. 2, by Benson; S. B. No. 3, by Rasband.

H. C. R. No. 1 is by the house joint committee. H. C. R. No. 2 is by Anderson and committee on the bill-presenting period the forty-fifth day of the session.

What Each Bill Has Cost.

Taking the ten bills passed up to date as a basis, then each has cost the state \$1,344. This does not include of course the cost of printing the bills, but that is hardly fair to blame the bills for all the expense. Besides some of those killed should be worth to the state, in their present condition, more than any of the successful measures cost.

Probably a fairer estimate would be one based on the cost to the state per minute, in the case of the bills, for example. The cost here is \$244 per day. The average house session lasts two hours, which, with an hour thrown in for evening sessions, which have just begun, would make the expense about \$1.30 per minute.

At this rate it will be seen how easily the reading of the journal costs a hole in \$25, for the journal seldom is read and corrected in less than twenty minutes. But the reading of the journal is necessary.

Some things which go to make up the expense roll are not so necessary. It is safe to say that if a member realized every time he was inclined to speak to a question "of personal privilege" that he was talking away over a dollar of the state's money every minute, many would not get beyond the inclination point.

Thompson's little poke at the railroads the other day cost the state over \$50, for he consumed forty minutes in his address and in the discussion which it provoked.

It cost the house \$40 Friday to adjourn because there was a formidable blockade to the wishes of the majority presented by a few "hurry-up" members.

None of the above estimates take into consideration contingent expenses, which have amounted thus far to about \$250. Then there is special work to be done and all this helps to pile up a grand total.

It is easily seen, as far as the bills are concerned, that the cost per measure will decrease directly with the increase in those passed, yet many believe that this would not prove economy in the end.
