Washington, Feb. 17.—The Panama Railroad company is capitalized at \$7,000,000. Its gross assets are \$15,850,000, of which \$12,628,000 is the value of the road, real estate, equipment, terminals and steamships, the balance being cash and treasury assets.

Grand Duke Sergius is reported that Grand Duke Alexis, Procurator of the Holy Synod, Pobedonostiev, and the general Trepoff, chief of police of Moscow, and the governor general of St. Petersburg, were also condemned to death and according to some reports similar sentences were imposed upon the dowager empress, Marie Fedorovna.

CHARACTER OF SERGIUS. Fought a Bitter End For Orthodoxy and Autocracy.

London, Feb. 18.—The correspondent at St. Petersburg of the Daily Telegraph asserts that the acting minister of justice, on hearing of the news of the assassination of Grand Duke Sergius, exclaimed: "In truth Russia is in a revolution. What will happen next?"

It must be admitted that Sergius was a most consistent and true career was rounded and complete. Orthodoxy and autocracy were inscribed on his forehead from the first, and he fought hard for them, in his own way, to the bitter end.
