

STANDARD OIL MAY LOSE LEASE

Reducing the Amount of Acres a Mere Subterfuge.

TALK IN THE CABINET

ILLINOIS IS ALSO AFTER THE "OCTOPUS."

Washington, Feb. 21.—Careful consideration was given today by the president and members of the cabinet to the proposed extension of the ten-year lease of oil rights on the Osage Indian lands in Oklahoma.

The subject of the proposed investigation of the operations of the oil operators in the Kansas field was discussed, but no definite conclusion was reached.

OKLAHOMA'S PROTEST.

Cutting the Lease in Two Regarded as a Subterfuge.

Guthrie, O. T., Feb. 21.—By a vote of 15 to 10 the lower house of the legislature tonight passed a joint resolution introduced this afternoon by Senator Decker, memorializing President Roosevelt to investigate the blanket lease of the oil lands of the Osage nation.

The perpetuation of the Osage lease, it is asserted, will greatly injure the commercial interests of Oklahoma, as well as the Osage Indian tribe.

ILLINOIS TO THE RESCUE.

Will Loan Kansas One Hundred Thousand Dollars For Refinery.

Springfield, Ill., Feb. 21.—The house today adopted two resolutions affecting the Standard Oil company. One, offered by Representative Allen, offers to loan the state of Kansas the sum of \$100,000, without interest, for a period of six years to aid in establishing a state oil refinery.

PHILIPPINE BILL PASSED.
