TRADE REPORTS ARE IRREGULAR.

Retail Distribution Retarded by Rainy Weather.

IRON AND STEEL BOUYANT

BUILDING IS BRISK AND MONEY FIRMER.

New York, April 21.—Bradstreet's to-morrow will say:

Trade reports are irregular in character, distribution of seasonal goods at retail being retarded by cool or rainy weather at the west, northwest and south, where iron products are in great demand.

Yarns are reported damaged by frosts. Industries, however, are active, jobbing trade at some centers is still active and retail is slow.

Buildings are being erected at the end of the week became more animated. Building is brisk and money firmer, bank clearings having increased heavily, prices in general display a downward tendency.

Iron and steel other iron, however, rather less pronounced. Inquiries for demand for iron are in great scarcity here being the immediate feature in the market.


