

THREE BREAK JAIL AT MANTI

Two Prisoners Are Recaptured, But the Third Still at Large.

SHERIFF'S POSSE PURSUES

RECORD OF THE PRISONERS IN SOUTHERN UTAH COUNTIES.

(Special to The Herald.) MANTI, Utah, May 7, 1905.—A jail-break and the escape of three prisoners at 7:30 this evening caused great excitement. Two of the fugitives were captured shortly after their escape, and Sheriff John Knudsen and a posse are hot on the trail of the third, but in spite of this the wildest rumors are afoot, especially as to the whereabouts of the third prisoner. It is reported that he was seen in the vicinity of the town of Manti, but he has not been seen since. Sheriff Knudsen is in the city, and he is expected to return to Manti in a few days. The three prisoners who escaped were William Moore, John Steele, and a third man whose name is not known. They were all captured at Manti on May 7. Two Have a Record.

The other two are considered to be a different class of men. They are William Moore of Moab, and his companion, named Steele, who are under suspicion of having been mixed up in a number of horse-stealing escapades in the southern part of the state. Moore was captured within an hour after the alarm was given. He was found in the bushes near the electric line, and he was taken to the county jail. Steele was captured by City Marshal Bryant Harmon. He left immediately after the jail delivery with a rig secured from Hugh McCall, the hotel proprietor, and the report flew about that the rig was intended to help the prisoners escape. Later in the night DeLoe returned, and it developed that he was the agent for some men who had had horses stolen lately and was as anxious as anyone could be to have the rig. The first heard here of Moore and Steele was from San Juan county. Moore was arrested there on the charge of horse stealing, but escaped on some defect in the information. He was afterwards arrested in Grand county on another charge of horse stealing and held to appear for trial in Grand county. He failed to appear for trial, and he is naturally deeply interested in the attempted escape.

Long, Stern Chase.

After Moore failed to appear for trial in Grand county a bench warrant was issued by the judge, and placed in the hands of Deputy Sheriff Turner of that county. In company with another deputy whose name was not learned, Turner started in pursuit of Moore and Steele. He got traces of them at Green River, where they were supposed to have stolen other horses. Turner followed his men through Emery county, down through Sevier canyon, and into San Juan county, where he secured their arrest near Fairview a week ago. Turner and his brother officer are now in Manti stopping at the Tuttle hotel, and they are naturally deeply interested in the attempted escape.
