

EIGHT YEARS OF MOCK ROYALTY

Woman Sat on a Throne in Staid Old Boston.

CLAIMED TO BE CARLOTTA

PEERAGES PROMISED AND MONEY CAME EASY.

Boston, May 14.—A woman who claimed to be Carlotta, wife of Maximilian, former emperor of Mexico, and brother of Francis Joseph, present emperor of Austria, has according to the Herald, left the city after securing \$40,000 from members of the Italian colony on the pretense that she was rightfully claimant to the Austrian throne. "She is," the Herald says, "being sought by over 100 residents of the North End district, who for almost eight years have been paying her money to enable her, as they supposed, to gain possession of the Austrian throne, upon which event taking place she promised that those who helped her would be made ministers and nobles and be given vast estates. One woman, the wife of a prominent Italian, gave her \$5,000 on the strength of the promise that she should be made a duchess. An organ grinder contributed a few hundred dollars, all his savings, with the understanding that he would be made court musician. Others contributed tens and hundreds on similar assurances.

Held Court in Boston.

"Many Italian residents secretly visited her at her royal headquarters, a handsomely furnished room in a dwelling house on the corner of two South End streets, where the pseudo queen sat on an imposing throne, resplendent in red cloth and tinsel and graciously allowed them to kiss her hand on the occasions on which they brought her tributes of money. At each side of the throne stood courtiers and a body guard who clanked stage arms.

"Mysterious secrets such as would overthrow the present Austrian ruler were credited to this woman. When she appeared in Boston eight years ago it was mysteriously whispered among the few in the North End that Carlotta, sister-in-law of Emperor Francis Joseph, was in Boston in disguise, having escaped from Brussels, where she had for many years been confined in an asylum.

Italians Easily Duped.

"Italians are fairly familiar with Austrian history, and when they were told that Carlotta had come here to collect a few faithful followers on whom she could rely, and enough money to return to Austria and use in connection with her court secrets, and that those who aided her would rank when she gained the throne, in her royal favor, they believed their fortunes made.

"Carlotta's aides in this vast enterprise were a number of select and dashing young men of various nationalities, among whom were Morarty, who represented himself to be Crown Prince Rudolph, eldest son of Emperor Francis Joseph, who in January, 1889, shot himself. "Lastly the Italians had become suspicious and begun to hint openly that Carlotta and her henchmen were delaying matters. Recent visits to the throne room disclosed that the woman had left."

SCOPE TO BE WIDENED

Federal Grand Jury to Look After the Steel Trust and Drug Monopoly.

Chicago, May 14.—Following the present investigation of the packing industries by the federal grand jury, according to the Chicago Chronicle, steps will be taken by the federal authorities to make an investigation of the drug and steel industries, with a view of determining whether or not the large firms controlling the bulk of these industries are not violating the anti-trust laws.

The secret service men, it is said, are now at work securing evidence to be used in connection with the two inquiries, and it is asserted that Attorney General Moody has practically outlined the course which the officials in charge of prosecutions shall pursue.

Information concerning the inquiries has been communicated to officials and attorneys for the large steel and drug corporations, who declare that they have nothing to conceal.

ALL THE AUTO BOATS IN THE RACE WERE EITHER SUNK OR DISABLED

Toulon, May 14.—The auto-boat race from Algiers to Toulon has ended unfortunately, all of the boats participating in the second stage of the run from Port Mahon to this port being either sunk or disabled owing to a heavy storm when still many miles from the finish. The arrangements for escorting the craft, however, were efficiently organized, and so far as known there has been no loss of life.

The seven boats left Port Mahon Saturday morning at 4 o'clock for Toulon. A torpedo boat destroyer accompanied each auto-boat while two cruisers followed. The sea was somewhat rough at the start and soon became worse. The competing boats were unable to withstand the violence of the storm and requested the warships to tow them. Shortly afterward the Mercedes C. P. sank men from the torpedo boat destroyer Hallebarde rescuing her crew. The cruiser La Hire hoisted the Fiat and her crew aboard. The Camille was abandoned, the destroyer Dard saving her crew. The Hercules II is adrift, but her crew is on board the destroyer Sarbacane. The Malgrec-Toul sank and her crew was taken on board the destroyer Carabine. The Mercedes had to be abandoned, the destroyer Pertrusse saving the crew.

"There is no news concerning the Quand-Meme, about which there is considerable anxiety. Her crew consisted of seven men, including the Duke de Cases. The cruisers Desaix and Kleber are searching for the vessel.

Terrific Storm. Accounts furnished by officers of the destroyers which have arrived here with the wrecked auto-boats crews show that the storm which overtook the frail craft shortly after their departure from Port Mahon was of terrific intensity, the waves attaining a height of twenty-five feet. It was impossible to keep the flotilla in tow, steel hawsers breaking repeatedly, owing to the sea's fury, and the destroyers themselves being in imminent danger. In several instances they were compelled to cast off tow lines in order to avoid collision. Some of the competitors, however, persisted in racing until they were swamped. Sometimes, owing to the mountainous waves, they were lost from their consort's view. The cruisers Desaix and Kleber, though much buffeted by the tempest, kept up constant and wireless communication with the convoying destroyers, standing by in order to render assistance.

Awful Experience. The condition of the racers' crews bears out the statements regarding their awful experiences. All were thoroughly exhausted and scarcely able to reply to inquiries. They consider themselves fortunate to have escaped with their lives. Many of them had their clothes torn to ribbons and some are bruised, while a member of the Malgrec-Toul's crew had a leg broken. When they were landed at the Toulon quay by the destroyers a great gathering of sympathizers awaited them, the event having attracted sportsmen of many nations to the finishing point owing to the international character of the original entries, which included French, German, Italian, British and American boats. The latter two, however, did not take part in the race owing to their late arrival.

Boats Missing. Anxiety regarding the fate of the auto-boat Quand-meme is growing in intensity, more especially as the convoying destroyer Arbalète is also unaccounted for. The cruisers Kleber and Desaix returned to harbor this evening after a vain search, being obliged to seek shelter from a terrific hurricane accompanied by torrential rain.

Daring Rescues. The auto boat crews relate stories of daring rescues by the warships. When Mme. Dugast's Camille broke down the destroyer Dard, having several times unsuccessfully attempted to approach her, the cruiser Kleber lowered a whale boat, but owing to the darkness of the night and the heavy seas, the effort to reach the auto boat failed. The Kleber then approached and threw grapplings, finally succeeded in saving all on board, though Mme. Dugast fell into the sea.

The rescue of the crew of the Hercules was also an exciting one. After three men had been taken off she went adrift with the remaining two men. Ten attempts were made to rescue them, and finally, under powerful searchlights, they were taken from the boat just as she disappeared beneath the waves.

Search to be Made. There is still no news of the destroyer Arbalète or the auto boat Quand-meme, the latter, it is now stated, carrying a complement of eleven men. It is thought possible that both are running before the gale in the direction of Corsica. The cruiser Kleber will start on a fresh search in the morning. Duchesse de Cases is reported to have received late tonight a telephonic message from Toulon stating that her husband's auto boat, the Quand-meme, has been sighted by the destroyer Arbalète. This report, however, has not been confirmed.

ARIZONA PIONEER COMMITS SUICIDE

Phoenix, Ariz., May 15.—Henry Wickenburg, 85 years of age, was found dead today in a grove near his residence at Wickenburg, a small town fifty miles northwest of here, which bears his name. In his right hand was held a .32-caliber revolver and a powder-burned wound in the temple indicated suicide. Wickenburg has been insane for some time.

He was one of the oldest residents of Arizona and was widely known, not only as one of the picturesque characters of Arizona frontier history, but for the discovery of the famous Vulture mine in 1865.

When representatives of the clergy asked an officer if they might hold a meeting in a church he replied in the negative, saying that his orders were not to permit a meeting anywhere.

Cossacks Used Whips. St. Petersburg, May 14.—A small crowd attempted to bury this afternoon at the graves of the "January martyrs," as they are popularly called, at the Preobrazhensky cemetery, in the outskirts of the city. Cossacks dispersed the demonstrators.

Subsequently the crowd sang the "Marseillaise" while crossing the fields. The Cossacks then charged, using their whips freely and inflicting painful injuries.

Jews Were Sufferers. Simferopol, May 14.—The incendiary fire which started here on Saturday destroyed more than 140 shops, mostly belonging to Jews.

Big Crowds, But No Disorder. Moscow, May 14.—In spite of predictions of trouble, today passed quietly in Moscow. The traditional promenade of workmen was held in Sokolniki park and Hodynokskoe fields. There were big crowds, but no disorders.

Rumors of Jew-Baiting. Alexandrovsk, Government of Ekaterinoslav, May 14.—This city is disturbed by rumors of approaching Jew-baiting, in consequence of which rich Jews are leaving the city. Permission has been given the municipality to organize militia to preserve order.

NOW JOURNEYING TOWARD FRESNO

Cumberland Presbyterians Leave to Attend General Assembly.

GOOD PROSPECT FOR UNION

DISCOURSE BY REV. T. A. WIGGINTON OF EVANSVILLE.

The rally held jointly last night at the First Presbyterian church by the members of the Cumberland Presbyterian general assembly and the Presbyterian congregation, was well attended. Several of the ministers of the Cumberland Presbyterian church and Rev. W. M. Paden made short addresses, and at midnight the Cumberland delegation left on their special train for the general assembly to be held at Fresno, Cal., on May 18.

Judge W. E. Settle of Frankfort, Ky., presided at the rally and called on several of the ministers for five-minute addresses. Rev. J. W. McDonald of Oklahoma was assigned "Organization" and Rev. W. T. Thurmond of Arkansas spoke "The Pulpit and Sunday School Work" was discussed by Elder T. F. Perrin of Illinois, and "Civil Government" by Elder John Cobbs of St. Louis. "Education" was assigned to Rev. J. Darby, secretary of the board of education, and Rev. W. A. Province discussed the "Public Schools."

Before the opening of the programme Rev. W. M. Paden extended an address of welcome to the visiting Cumberland Presbyterians.

Good Prospect For Union. The closing remarks were made by Judge Settle, and reference was made to the prospect of the uniting of the two denominations which has been voted on by the Presbyterians and will be discussed at the general assembly this week. After the revision of the Presbyterians' confession of faith in 1903 a union of the Presbyterian churches was discussed and favorably voted on by the Presbyterians. The general assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterians was called for the consideration of this question and it is likely that the union will be made.

Discourse by Rev. T. A. Wigginton. The pulpit of the First Presbyterian church was occupied yesterday morning by Rev. T. A. Wigginton of Evansville, Ind., one of the Cumberland Presbyterian ministers who are on the way to their general assembly at Fresno, Cal. His theme was "The Essential Thing in All True Living." He magnified character and consecration to what is right over against mere surface success at the cost of principle. Dr. Wigginton ranks as one of the leading men of his denomination and is prominently mentioned in connection with the moderatorship of the general assembly at Fresno.

During the afternoon the delegates and their wives spent the day in seeing Salt Lake City. A large number of them attended the services at the tabernacle, which others walked about the city. A party also visited Saltair and returned in the evening. They left at midnight for the general assembly at Fresno, Cal.
