District Court Grind. Judge J. A. Howell in the district court yesterday heard the arguments in the case of Marion Bous and Leo R. Richey.

The case was taken under advisement and the case of the Consolidated Wagon & Machine company against T. C. Foster, was taken up. The action is for the purpose of recovering about \$400 on notes.

STATE NEWS

CITY COUNCIL IN SESSION. Independent Telephone Franchise Is Again Postponed.

Park City, May 18.—If length of time consumed in holding a meeting were to be the indication of the amount of work done, the city council here last night established a record, as their meeting was one of the longest which has yet been held, but an observation of the minutes books reveals nothing more than the usual amount done.

The meeting to order the roll call showed a full board present and after the reading and approval of the minutes the work of the evening was taken up.

Under petitions a request signed by a committee in behalf of the citizens, the board asked that organization be allowed the use of the assembly room of the city hall on Tuesday and Friday evenings. The request was granted with the understanding that if at any time the practice of the board interfered with the work of other meetings they must give way.

Five firms presented petitions and bonds for license to sell liquors and the requests being accompanied by the receipt of the treasurer were granted and the licenses ordered issued.

Under the head of the report of committee Mr. Fargo, chairman of the independent telephone company, reported that he had been requested by the committee of the city council to present a report on a meeting with the committee of the city council be set for Friday evening so that ex-governor Wells and Emer Jones of the independent company might be able to talk the matter over with the committee having the matter of the franchise in hand. The request was granted and an action was taken on the petition and the council will meet with the gentlemen from Salt Lake on Friday evening.

Attorney Wright reported that in the matter of the Rio Grande Western railway agreement with the city he had had a communication from the company in which they requested a full account of the portions of the agreement which did not meet the approval of the council, accordingly he wrote full account of the distasteful portions but since that time he has had no reply.

The ordinance on license for saloons and pool halls was the subject which claimed the attention of the council for the longest space of time and it seemed that no compromise agreements could be had. The matter was called on by the council and the ordinance was passed.

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roll call vote was defeated by a vote of three to two. Taking up the tabled petition of last meeting relative to street light district, the council instructed the marshal to notify the residents of that portion of the city that hereafter window blinds must be always kept down and that the residents must at no time appear on the streets with their blinds out.

The fire chief was instructed to look after the city street signs and to see that they were in good condition.


