Seaboard Company Makes Its Capitalization \$72,000,000.

ACCIDENT ON LAGOON LINE

NORTHERN ANNOUNCES A NEW PASSENGER TARIFF.

Trenton, N. J., June 1.—The Seaboard company filed a certificate with the secretary of state today increasing its capital stock from \$4,000,000 to \$72,000,000, of this amount \$18,000,000 being preferred stock and \$54,000,000 common.

The increase was decided upon at a meeting of directors of the company held today at Jersey City. The company was originally incorporated in May 18, 1885, to manufacture, buy, sell, mortgage and otherwise dispose of rolling stock and other railway equipment.

WILL SHIP TO SALT LAKE.

Moab Growers to Patronize Green River Steamboat Line.

According to President J. L. Lumsden of the Green-Grand Navigation company Salt Lake is to be the objective point of shippers in the district who have contracted with the company to handle large shipments of fruit this season.

President Lumsden says that at the present time there is an obstruction in the Green river about five miles above the junction which prevents the operation of the boat through to Moab.

The boat has ten state rooms for the accommodation of tourists. The trip to the Cataracts and return can be made in four days, this allowing ample opportunity for stopping along the route to see the Cliff Dwellers remains which are here in great numbers, and at other interesting points.

TALK OF PEACE IN WASHINGTON

Count Cassini to Call at the White House Today and it is Hinted That This Government is Ready to Mediate.

U. P. Must Cut Rate.

Tonika, Kan., June 1.—The report of railroad commissioners issued an order today requiring the Union Pacific railroad to reduce its rates on a line from Chapman to Kansas City. The order declares that the Union Pacific has been guilty of discriminating in rate rates.

Buckley Succeeds O'Brien.

Portland, June 1.—M. J. Buckley was today appointed general superintendent of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company, to succeed J. P. O'Brien, who became general manager of the same lines in the northwest when B. A. Worthington resigned.

One of the Equitable Robbers Entered Plea of Guilty.

New York, June 1.—Samuel Lobley, who has been on trial in the supreme court in Brooklyn, charged with fraudulently obtaining money on a life insurance policy which is alleged to have been stolen from the vaults of the Equitable Life Assurance society in this city today withdrew his plea of not guilty and entered a plea of guilty.

BRUTAL MURDER CHARGED

SAN RAFAEL, Cal., June 1.—John Hancock, who completed a ten-year sentence for burglary, committed in Orange county in 1888, was arrested on a charge of murder, as he was leaving the prison today, by Sheriff Jacob Johnson and a special deputy of Lincoln county, Nevada.

PRISONER HAS JUST FINISHED TEN-YEAR SENTENCE.

The murder for which Hancock is under arrest was one of the most brutal and dastardly ever committed in Nevada. According to the confession of a Mrs. Meyer, made Nov. 29, 1888, Hancock, Mrs. Meyer and her young son, were driving from Persim, Cal., to Salt Lake City in 1887. One of their horses gave out, and while they were waiting for a ranch for it to recover, Dr. George Engleke, a veterinary surgeon, and Peter Edmiston, his servant, arrived with a team of horses and a valuable stallion. Engleke discussed his affairs with Hancock. The latter told Mrs. Meyer he intended to kill the doctor and his companion for their valuables. The woman declared she saw Hancock with a pistol a few days after the party left the ranch. She said that while Engleke and his servant were asleep Hancock brained them with an axe and buried their bodies.
