Second Will Not Arrive Until This Afternoon.

ALL ARE WELL AND HAPPY

ANGELENOS SPEEDING OVER SALT LAKE ROUTE.

(Special to The Herald.) CALIENTE, Nev., June 11.—Something like 320 men, desperately striving to forget their accustomed strenuous business lives, are speeding toward Salt Lake over the line of the Salt Lake Route.

Notables on Board. The first section of the train, consisting of four Pullman sleeping cars, one parlor car and one dining car, passed through Caliente between 5 and 6 o'clock and is due in Salt Lake about 8:30 tomorrow morning.

Second Section Is Late. The second section of the train, which is loaded chiefly with active members of the Los Angeles chamber of commerce, consists of eight Pullman sleeping cars, two dining cars and one parlor car.

Committee on Deck. The first section was met at Moapa early this afternoon by the Salt Lake committee, consisting of A. J. Davis and Dr. Ned Hewitt, representing the Commercial club, and Councilman E. H. Davis, representing the Salt Lake City council.

VISIT TO RULER OVER ABYSSINIA

King Menelik Believes He Is Descended from Solomon and the Queen of Sheba—Ark of the Covenant Said to Be in Abyssinia.

BERLIN, June 11.—Dr. Rosen, minister-elect to Morocco, has returned from Adis Ababa, Abyssinia, where he had gone as a special envoy of Germany to King Menelik for the purpose of concluding a commercial treaty between Abyssinia and this country.

Descended from Solomon. King Menelik's own belief, according to Dr. Rosen, is that he is descended from a son of Solomon and the queen of Sheba; that this son, who was called Prince Menelik the First, with a following of picked men, Jews and Sabians, went into Ethiopia and lived

and thrived there, and that these Jews were the founders of the present Abyssinian Semitic race. Menelik the First is presumed to have taken the ark of the covenant with him, and it is still asserted to be in a temple at Aksum. No European has ever seen it, and it has not been seen even by the present ruler of Abyssinia himself, only priests of high grade who are unmarried being permitted to behold it.

Likes American Hats. Dr. Rosen says that King Menelik is in the line of health and that, although he is 62 years of age, he looks only about 50. He is fond of wearing a broad-brimmed American hat when out of doors, but otherwise he dresses in the loose garments of the country. When indoors the king wears a large kerchief folded about his head.

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BANKER BIGELOW IS BEHIND BARS

Milwaukee Embezzler Landed at Fort Leavenworth.

OTHER BANKERS THERE TODAY HE WILL DON THE PRISON SUIT.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., June 11.—Frank G. Bigelow, the former Milwaukee banker, was brought to the United States penitentiary at Fort Leavenworth at 7:40 tonight. John Spiciale, a counterfeiter under a five-year sentence, was brought along as a fellow prisoner with Bigelow, and they were in charge of Andrew Johnson and Charles Kelley, deputy marshals.

Cheered the Counterfeiter. On making the turn in the walk on the Riverside driveway at Fort Leavenworth, when the penitentiary loomed up in front of the party, the counterfeiter showed a disposition to weaken.

Warden McLaughrey remained upstairs in his office, and no special ceremony was shown. Deputy Warden Lemon was at the second or inner gate, and Bigelow will have a position of this kind. There are five national bank prisoners in the penitentiary, and four of these are clerks and one answers the name of the National Bankers' association while Bigelow was president.

Other Bankers There. The brother and son of Bigelow remained downstairs and watched through the grating until they saw him escorted into a cell. They then sought an interview with Warden McLaughrey, and conversed with him privately.

MURDER IN MOROCCO. Tanger, June 11.—Moorish robbers entered the Austrian vice consulate at Mazagan on June 6 and murdered Vice Consul Madden, a British subject, who also represented Denmark, and who had been established there for many years. They also fired at and wounded his wife. The assassins escaped. The Austrian and British authorities have sent energetic protests to the sultan's minister.
