SAILORS SHOWED WHITE FEATHER

Surrender of the Mutinous Crew of the Kniat Potemkine.

SEA FIGHT WAS EXPECTED

Cowardly course taken a great surprise.

ODESSA, June 30.—Without firing a gun or making the slightest show of resistance, the mutineers on the Kniat Potemkine hoisted down the red flag and surrendered the battleship to Vice Admiral Kruger's squadron, which arrived here at noon today.

How St. Petersburg First Learned of the Surrender.

St. Petersburg, July 1, 3 a. m.—The first news from Odessa of the surrender of the Kniat Potemkine to Vice Admiral Kruger's squadron reached here through the Associated Press.

Martial Law.

Martial law has been declared at Sebastopol, and an extraordinary powers have been granted to Admiral Chukin, commander of the Black sea fleet.

Danger Has Passed.

With the surrender of the Kniat Potemkine, however, the immediate danger of the situation seemed to collapse.

Rumor Not Confirmed.

Late last night a rumor gained currency that a mob had sacked a small arms factory at Koipino, twenty miles away.

No Promises Made.

Mutinous crew compelled to surrender unconditionally.

Naval Fight Expected.

After the shots the Kniat Potemkine fired before midnight Thursday, nothing further happened.

Commander Was Killed.

Commander Gokoloff was among the killed in the night when the Kniat Potemkine appeared off Odessa.

SUICIDE AT BANCROFT, IDA.

Pocatello, Ida., June 30.—Word was received this morning that John Ashford, an old time resident of southeastern Idaho and well known here, committed suicide by hanging at Bancroft. He had long been a sufferer from neuritis, and it is believed he ended his life in a fit of despondency.

STRIKE OF FARM LABORERS.
