Phoenix, Ariz., July 11.—Samuel Plunkett, a stock grower and a man in his employ named E. A. Kennedy, were murdered presumably on July 12, at Plunkett's ranch, one and a half miles above Livingston, a little town at the head of the basin of the Roosevelt storage reservoir on the upper Salt river.

ANTI-TOXIN MAY CURE HIM.

Daniel J. Jacobs Is Apparently Recovering From a Case of Lockjaw.

Hope for the recovery of Daniel J. Jacobs, the grocer, whose case of lockjaw is the only one west of Chicago resulting from the celebration of the recent Fourth of July, is entertained by Dr. Charles Stewart, who has been treating him with lockjaw anti-toxin.

According to medical history, Jacobs should be dead by this time. Cases where the anti-toxin has worked cures, were always those where it was applied almost immediately after the infliction of the wound.

However, Jacobs was better last evening. Analysis of the pus made by Dr. Stewart and Dr. T. B. Beatty, shows the presence of several varieties of secondary streptococci as well as the lockjaw bacilli. In all respects the Jacobs case is looked on by the doctors as remarkable, and should the man recover, as there now seems faint hope, it will be regarded as still more strange.

CAUSED BY CLODBURST.

Engineer O'Donnell Injured in Wreck and Roadbed of Salt Lake Route Damaged Near Las Vegas.

A cloudburst thirty-five miles east of Las Vegas caused a freight wreck on the Salt Lake route, in which Engineer O'Donnell of Caliente suffered a broken ankle, yesterday morning. The rush of water washed out a short section of the track, delaying traffic several hours.

The freight was coming east when it encountered the washout. The locomotive and two of the cars left the rails. O'Donnell applied the air brakes in time to avert a serious wreck. He was the only person injured.

Superintendent H. E. Van Housen left last evening on the regular passenger train for the scene of the accident. The most serious damage is that which the road bed suffered, and this is being repaired as speedily as possible.
