

STATE FAIR IS READY TO OPEN

Gates Will Swing Wide Tomorrow Morning.

BIG CROWDS ARE EXPECTED EXHIBITS REACH VALUE OF MANY THOUSANDS.

The state fair of 1905 will be ready for the public tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock, though the opening ceremonies do not occur until 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Weather Prospects Good. The prospects for good weather, the same as of a successful fair, were pronounced excellent by Weather Observer Hyatt yesterday.

The opening of the fair takes place tomorrow afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. At that hour Governor Cutler and his staff will appear on the band platform in the manufactures and liberal arts building, accompanied by the fair directors and invited guests.

The first free attraction, the exact nature of which will be announced tomorrow morning, will be the races. At the close of the race program there will be other free attractions.

In the evening the free attractions will be repeated, with the addition of fireworks and spectacular features. The grounds and buildings will be brilliantly illuminated so that the exhibits will be even more attractive by night than by day.
