

ANOTHER REPORT ON EQUITABLE

Shrinkage in Estimated Value of Real Estate. Four State Executives Promise Co-operation in Tourist Scheme.

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 5.—Francis Hendricks, state superintendent of insurance, today made public a supplementary report by R. H. Hunter, deputy superintendent of insurance, and Chief Examiner Isaac Vanderpool, on the condition of the Equitable Life Assurance society of the United States at the close of business on June 29, 1935.

To the book value of real estate the company has acquired under foreclosure the report adds \$23,739, making the total estimated value of such real estate \$4,964,569.

Loans on Policies. The loans made by the company on the security of policies assigned as collateral amount to \$25,865,830.50, according to the report, and the bonds and stocks owned by the company have a par value of \$185,960,567, as against a book value of \$219,430,408 and a current market value on June 19, 1935, of \$232,565,922.

That \$600,000 Check. The report discussed at length a payment of \$600,000 in the form of a check drawn by the society to the Mercantile Trust company and dated Feb. 4, 1934.

Bad Bookkeeping. Of the society's records the report has this to say: "In the investigation of other matters where it became necessary to establish the title of certain securities of which the society was the owner, the incomplete and defective nature of the voucher records or authorizations in writing from the book entries connected with these securities were ordered to be made over so as to render it practically impossible to ascertain the status of these securities as to whether or not recourse was had to sources independent of the books or records of the society."

Computing the assets of the society after making deductions noted, the report states that the admitted assets are \$18,072,062, and the total liabilities are estimated at the same amount. In arriving at the total of the liabilities the total reserve, which includes the present value of outstanding annuities and annuities, is estimated at \$338,888,123, and the reserve for surplus funds is placed at \$62,608,624.63.

A table of interest rates shows that the society realized the following rates on its assets of last year: United States mortgages, 4.25 per cent; on stocks and bonds, 4.37 per cent; on mean real estate, 2.27 per cent; on mean net assets, 4.27.
