SPANISH RAILS BOUGHT HERE.
Some American railroad men are evening matters up with the Steel trust by buying rails abroad. The trust's little habit of laying rails down in foreign lands more cheaply than they will sell the same rails to American purchasers has reacted in the New York Times of recent date is the story of the purchase of 21,000 tons of rails from the Altores Herne de Viscaya mills of Bilbao, Spain.

A SPLENDID START.

As the duty is \$4 per ton and the freight in the neighborhood of \$5, it will be seen that the Spaniards are apparently in a position to manufacture steel rails as cheaply as they can be made in the United States.
