Police Will Charge Him With Five Separate Offenses.

STOLEN PROPERTY FOUND

NIGHT WATCHMAN SEES HIM IN A TRUNK FACTORY.

Flood stains left by William Ross, colored, on a board fence in the rear of Hubert Bros' trunk factory, 23 South Main street, where he jumped through a window about 5 o'clock yesterday morning to escape, after an attempted burglary, led his arrest about 10 o'clock yesterday morning. He was caught on an Oregon Short Line train with 200 worth of goods in his possession, secured in five burglaries since Saturday night. The arrest was made just as the train was pulling out, by Sergeant Richard L. Edgington and Police Officers James Taylor and Charles Sherry.

Towel Covered With Blood.

About 12:30 o'clock a towel was found covered with blood in a room in the Rutte rooming house, 12 East Second South. Upon inquiry it was learned that a colored man had occupied the room during the night. From an expressman it was learned that three telescopic glasses and two dress suit cases were taken from that room to the Oregon Short Line depot.

"LIMITED" WILL ARRIVE TODAY

Palatial Los Angeles Train on Its Initial Trip to Salt Lake.

NEWSPAPER MEN ON BOARD

SALT LAKE ROUTE OFFICIALS HERE TO MEET SPECIAL.

The first train of the Los Angeles Limited service will arrive in Salt Lake from Chicago at 4:05 o'clock this afternoon over the Oregon Short Line. Ten minutes later it will depart for Los Angeles over the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake road, arriving at Los Angeles at 4:45 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Entertain Newspaper Men.

About twenty correspondents, representing New York, Chicago and other eastern newspapers, are aboard the train. The host of the newspaper party is E. L. Loumax, general passenger agent of the Union Pacific, who will accompany them to Los Angeles. At Salt Lake, however, the party will be joined by Kenneth C. Kerr, secretary of the Press club of Salt Lake and traveling passenger agent of the Salt Lake Route, and T. C. Peck, assistant general passenger agent of the Salt Lake Route, who will go to Los Angeles and assist Mr. Loumax in entertaining the press representatives.

Decorate Dining Car.

The dining car, which will be a part of the Limited train between Salt Lake and Los Angeles, arrived here yesterday morning. It will be decorated with flowers and run on a sidetrack at the depot at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon, half an hour before the Limited arrives. It is the intention of the Salt Lake road to change dining cars at Salt Lake on every trip of the Limited.

"Limited" at Omaha.

Omaha, Dec. 18.—The new Los Angeles Limited, which left Chicago last night, reached Omaha last night over the Chicago & Northwestern, leaving fifteen minutes later over the Union Pacific for the west. The train goes via the Union Pacific and San Pedro roads, arriving in Los Angeles Wednesday night. The train had a good passenger list and carried a party of forty newspaper men.

APPEAL IS MADE ON 'PHONE STRIKE

Both Sides Will Submit Case to Higher Authorities.

MEN ALL REMAIN AT WORK

DIFFERENCE AS TO INTERPRETATION OF CERTAIN CLAUSE.

The second conference of the committee appointed by the local union of electrical workers and officials of the Rocky Mountain Bell telephone company was held yesterday morning. While the affair has not reached a final adjustment, the thirty men who were let out because they joined the union are at work and will continue to work their regular capacities until the matter has been settled by outside authorities.

Disagree as to Meaning of Clause.

At first the situation looked foreboding, as both sides were firm in their respective stands. Discussion led to the discovery that the origin of the trouble was two interpretations of the written agreement drafted at a meeting of the union and telephone company's officials May 1 last. At this meeting both sides signed an agreement setting forth the wages, hours of work, etc., of the men in the employ of the telephone company. D. S. Murray and General Superintendent H. Sommers represented the telephone company. E. A. Elmore, who has been deputized to represent the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, and the committee selected from members of the union attended for that organization.

Appeal to Higher Authorities.

Both sides were firm in their interpretation of the evasive clause. Seeing no decision would be reached under these conditions Manager Murray suggested each side submit a copy of the agreement and its interpretation to higher authorities for final decision. This plan met with the hearty approval of both representations. The union will send a copy of the agreement and its interpretation to F. J. McNulty, president of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers at Washington, D. C. The telephone company will appeal to President F. P. Fish of the American Telegraph & Telephone company at Boston. These two men will give their opinions as to the agreement. If both opinions uphold the telephone company the installers will drop out from the party. If, however, both decisions favor the union the company will make concessions. A month will be consumed in waiting for the reply to the appeals.
