Lessons Drawn From Life of Wise Man of American History.

SECRET OF HIS STRENGTH

WHERE HE STOOD IN RELIGIOUS MATTERS.

At the Unitarian services yesterday Rev. Frank Fay Eddy drew lessons from the life of Benjamin Franklin, whom he termed the wise man of American history.

It is appropriate to take a text from Proverbs in referring to Benjamin Franklin, for he is often compared to Solomon, the supposed author of Proverbs.

Franklin is not only quite as great as a maker and adapter of Proverbs as Solomon, but is rather better deserving the title of being a man of wisdom.

For historical reasons, Franklin can be better used as a type of the wise man than Solomon. For we are certain of Franklin's words and deeds as a man of wisdom and acumen, while of Solomon there is little reliable information whereby we can justify the reputation for wisdom with which he is credited.

We know that he wrote Poor Richard's Almanac, but no man can say with assurance who wrote the Book of Proverbs into its present form.
