WILL CUT OUT PINTSCH GAS

Harriman Lines to Substitute Electricity on All Trains.

Announcement has been made in Ogden to the effect that within the near future the Harriman lines will abolish the use of Pintsch gas on their trains. It is believed that this move will be made because of the many fires that have occurred where there have been wrecks and which ignited from the burning gas. Electricity is already used in the limited trains.

The gas sets fire to the wreckage and usually a great amount of mail is lost. It is a very serious danger to the trainmen and mail clerks, who are very often caught by the wreckage.
