LEVEL OF PRICES SOON RESTORED

Wall Street Market Opened Lower, in Sympathy With Movements in London.

AWAITING PUBLIC DEMAND

SPECULATORS BELIEVE BOOM IS AT HAND.

New York, March 31.—The slight opening price recessions in the stock market today were due largely to sympathy with the London market, in which prices of Americans moved irregularly.

Conditions in the coal industry had special reflection in the day's movement, especially the decision of the miners to accept the terms offered by that portion of the soft coal operators which contended the miners' demand for making a shutdown of production general.

Rumors were busily circulated at the same time that the plan for the disposition of the Great Northern's iron lands to the United States Steel corporation had been consummated.

There has been some additional participation in the stock market this week, which is commonly attributed to an apparently professional origin.

The first of April has been looked forward to for a long time as likely to mark the period of maximum requirement on the money market.

Prices of bonds have been fairly well maintained, but business in that department was small.
