

DEAD, INJURED AND MISSING

Latest Story of the Calamity Which Visited the Beautiful City of Santa Rosa.

BUSINESS SECTION RUINED

PEOPLE REFUSE TO SLEEP IN HOUSES STILL STANDING.

Santa Rosa, April 21.—The list of known dead now totals 53, and it is believed that 100 is conservative estimate of the number of people who lost their lives in the awful catastrophe which visited this city on Wednesday morning.

The entire business section is in ruins and practically every residence in town is more or less damaged, fifteen or twenty being badly wrecked. The damage to residences, however, was caused principally by the sinking of their foundations, which let many structures down onto the ground.

Complete Destruction.

It is almost impossible for an outsider to realize the situation as it actually exists here. No such complete destruction of a city's business interests ever before resulted from an earthquake in America.

Sleeping Out of Doors.

Almost everyone here is sleeping out of doors, being afraid to enter their homes except for a short while at a time until repairs have been made.

Under Martial Law.

The city is under full martial law, company C of Petaluma having been called to assist the local company in preserving order.

MAY FILE SUIT AGAINST STATE

Idaho Sugar Company Demands Payment of Bounty Guaranteed by State Law.

REPORTS LOSS FOR YEAR

DIVIDENDS DISCONTINUED FOR THE PRESENT.

Because the state of Idaho has refused to pay its promised bounty to the Idaho Sugar company, suit will most likely be brought against the state in the attempt to recover this money. This action was practically decided upon at the annual meeting of the company in Salt Lake Friday afternoon.

made his report in which he set forth the difficulties through which the company passed during the last year on account of the blight that had visited Idaho. He stated that the shortage of water and the blight had been severest in the vicinity of Blackfoot and that this factory had been kept running at a considerable loss.

The report showed that the two factories at Sugar City and Idaho Falls had paid the farmers \$656,103.46 for beets, \$308,961.56 for labor and material, and \$23,976.71 for taxes, making a total expenditure of \$1,049,041.73.

Mr. Cutler explained that this sum does not include the general expenses of the company, interest on money borrowed, etc., and is also exclusive of beets bought, labor, material etc., at the Blackfoot agency.

Discontinues Dividend.

Dividends were ordered discontinued for the present owing to the unsatisfactory showing for last year.

The outlook for the coming season, Manager Cutler stated, is promising. About 20,000 acres of beets have already been contracted for in the vicinity of the three factories, and the acreage is on the increase.

The old board of directors was re-elected with the exception of Soren Hanson, who is unable to devote his time to the interests of the company. The board now consists of Joseph F. Smith, John R. Winder, Thomas H. Cutler, W. S. McCormick, John Henry Smith, Heber J. Grant, John C. Cutler, George C. Parkinson, George Romney.
