TAINS CROWDED WITH REFUGEES

People Hastening Homeward From 'Frisco Well Cared for by Railroads and Citizens.

Every train passing through Ogden en route east yesterday carried refugees from San Francisco. Compared with the large number passing through here, few were destitute, and those that were with relief committee who saw that all were fed and properly housed while in this city.

Care for Refugees.

Ogden will probably confine its efforts to taking care of the refugees who arrive here and not ship any more supplies raised here, and it is expected that the number of refugees will increase each day from the next week or ten days. It is a difficult matter to keep track of all the cars of supplies passing through Ogden. Each and every train going west has one or more cars and many of these bear banners with suitable inscriptions. As far as could be checked up yesterday the supplies headed west are about as follows:

Car of meat from Topeka; car of flour from Gosco, Neb.; car of provisions from Platte, Neb.; car of flour from North Platte, Neb.; car of flour from Grand Island, Neb.; car of flour from Cambridge, Neb.; car of provisions from Nebraska City, Neb.; car of flour and provisions from Aurora, Neb.; car of flour from North-Western, car of provisions from Blair, Neb.; car of provisions from Raymond, Neb.; car of cereals from Cedar Rapids, Ia.

Trains of Supplies.

A train of twelve cars of supplies passed through Ogden about 6 o'clock last evening. One train today will run as first section of the Overland Limited, indicating that the freight schedule is being made with the supply trains.
