DEFERRED MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE TRIP

Utah's Weight Man Unable to Compete at Boulder Account of Death in the Family.

Fourteen track and field athletes of the university will leave this evening at 8 o'clock for Boulder, Colo., where they will contest for the championship of the Rocky mountain states on Saturday. The men selected to go are "Fuzzy" Moore, Dale Pitt, Dale Parks, Melvin Swapp, Morgan Adams, William Hunt, Harry Scott, Leonard Bailey, John Hume, George Brown, "Fuzzy" Russell, Judd, Emery Hodges and Frank Neilson. With the exception of two men, this makes up the entire track team. It was considered necessary that the university send this many men despite the fact that the burden of expense will have to fall upon the local school, since there are to be heats in all the short races. Each school is allowed two entries in each of the events.

The Utah men will most probably be entered as follows: 100-yard dash, Moore and Parks; 200-yard dash, Moore and Parks; 400-yard run, Brown and Judd; 800-yard run, Pitt and Hume; mile run, Scott and Hume; two-mile run, Scott and Bailey; 10-yard hurdles, Parks and Hunt; relay, Pitt, Judd, Swapp and Brown; shot put, Brown and Russell; discus throw, Swapp and Brown; hammer throw, Swapp and Russell; broad jump, Hunt and Swapp; high jump, Swapp and Hodges; pole vault, Adams and Russell. Fred Bennion will be unable to accompany the team on account of the recent death of his father. Bennion's absence greatly reduces Utah's chances of winning the meet, as he was quite sure of at least eight points for his team.

TRACK TEAM DISBANDED.

High School Unable to Schedule Track Meet.

The members of the high school track team have stopped training for the year and will not participate in any more meets. Coach Callahan arrived at this decision yesterday morning and in the afternoon the athletes turned their goods over to the athletic association. There seems to be much regret that another meet was not secured because of the number of the men who will leave school this year and the field men who have been training since the first of the season for their events will not get a chance to make good. There was some talk of securing a meet with Ogden, but this will be impossible as next Saturday is the only open date at the university before school closes, and the men could not get ready for a meet by that time. The track team also met yesterday and decided to have a large picture taken to present to the school.
