

RATE WILL BEING MADE OVER AGAIN

Knox and Foraker Become Active on the Floor of the House.

FORMER GROWS SARCASTIC

LATTER SAYS MEASURE IS UNCONSTITUTIONAL.

Washington, May 17.—Pipe lines were the first things taken under discussion when the senate resumed consideration of the railroad rate bill today. Senator Beveridge presented, but later withdrew an amendment to include pipe lines carrying gas. Senator Lodge said he cared little about the gas provision, what he wanted was to control the Standard Oil company, which is the oil business of the country by the throat.

Senator Talliferro presented an amendment excluding only natural gas for municipal use from the provision, making pipe lines common carriers.

Mr. Talliferro's motion was rejected and the amendment left as it stood before the controversy began.

The provision including express companies and sleeping car companies as common carriers was also left undisturbed.

Anti-Pass Provision.

The anti-pass provision was then taken up, and a new draft by Senator Culbertson was adopted in place of the amendment adopted yesterday. The only change made was in phraseology and all the classes specified yesterday were excepted. The provision was still further amended, at the instance of Senator Hansbrough, so as to make the penalty apply to persons asking and accepting passes as well as to those granting them. The penalty is a fine of from \$100 to \$200.

Senator Dooliver moved to add traveling secretaries of the Y. M. C. A., and the amendment was accepted.

Senator Hale then moved to include "baseball and football players," and Senator McLaurin "widows and orphans." Both were voted down amid laughter. The amendment as modified was then finally accepted.

Aimed at Coal Roads.

The provision prohibiting common carriers from transporting articles of their own production was then taken up and after some changes in phraseology the amendment was agreed to. There were several efforts to extend the time when the provision shall go into effect, but they were unsuccessful. Senator Stone made an ineffectual effort to have pipe lines excepted and Senator Piles made several efforts to have the provision apply only to common carriers "whose principal business is that of common carrier."

Senator LaFollette secured the addition of a penalty clause to the provision requiring railroad companies to put in switches and supply cars to shippers.

Debate Precipitated.

The amendments to section 2, dealing with railroad tariff schedules, were all accepted without discussion, and it looked for a time as if the entire section might be disposed of very speedily, until Senator Lodge sought to have the words "knowingly and willfully" inserted in connection with the penalty for granting rebates or discriminating in favor of any shipper. The amendment precipitated debate.

This controversy took the shape of a discussion of the efficacy of the imprisonment penalty for violation of the interstate commerce law, and was participated in by Messrs. Foraker, LaFollette, Clarke of Arkansas, Gallinger, Knox, McCumber and Bailey.

Bailey's Suggestion.

The Texas senator suggested that if the penalty against both carrier and shipper should stand the government would find itself without witnesses in the prosecution of offenders. Mr. McCumber declared that the great trusts are "the principal criminals in the rebate matter."

The Lodge amendment was accepted, and the provision was agreed to after the

acceptance of a suggestion by Senator Stone making the penalty clause explicitly applicable to shippers as well as carriers.

Senator McCumber presented a substitute for his provision imposing a penalty for accepting rebates amounting to three times the amount received, omitting the imprisonment penalty. The substitute was accepted.

Tillman Has Doubts.

When section four, granting authority to the interstate commerce commission to fix rates, was reached, Senator Tillman asked Senator Allison for his opinion as to the propriety of retaining the words, "in its judgment," in the clause empowering the commission to prescribe just and reasonable rates. The Iowa senator replied that he had consulted several lawyers and was convinced that "the words constitute an essential part of the bill and should be retained."

Mr. Tillman said he had been informed that the clause would render the bill unconstitutional, and he moved to strike out the words, "in its judgment," saying that he had not found any one who could tell what the words mean. If it was desired to say that the words would be construed as rendering the findings of the commission final he thought that there should be an affirmative declaration to that effect.

Senator Dooliver defended the language, saying the words "have the effect of confiding in the commission a discretion very necessary to its operation."

Disclaimer by Knox.

He referred to Senator Knox's Pittsburgh speech of his opinion, but the Pennsylvania senator said that that speech had no applicability to the pending measure.

Mr. Knox quoted his own rate bill, saying that the language used in it was intended to apply to the question of a court review. He had, he said, submitted the bill because he had been gratuitously arraigned as a railroad senator, and, desirous to show contrary he had hastily presented a bill covering especially the court review question. His clerk had put the bill together and had used the words, "in its judgment," and he had not discovered the fact until after the measure was in print. "I want it emphatically understood," he went on, "that if it comes to the proposed law on account of the insertion of these words, I do not want to be held responsible for their presence there."

Foraker's Opinion.

Senator Foraker pronounced the clause "a mere jugglery of words," and contended that it was legally non-essential whether the words "in its judgment" are retained or not, except that he was sure that the retention of the words would be construed as the senate's own condemnation of the measure. "I regard the law as unconstitutional," he said. "The trouble is that it is fundamentally wrong, and you can't make a silk purse out of a sow's ear any more than you could when that expression found first utterance."

With Senator Teller's motion to strike out the words, "in its judgment," still pending, the senate adjourned until 11 o'clock tomorrow.

JOINT ACTION PROPOSED

Great Powers May Insist Upon Keeping Foreigners Upon Chinese Payroll.

Peking, May 17.—The ministers of the powers are considering the question of taking joint action on the customs question. While the Chinese assurances are plausible, there are strong evidences that the authorities fully intend to replace the foreigners in the service by Chinese when they are in a position to do so.

In conversation between foreign ministers and the Chinese officials the latter maintain an independent attitude, intimating that the question is one with which foreigners have no right to interfere. It is considered significant that the edict was issued without any previous consultation with Sir Robert Hart and immediately after the departure from Peking of the ministers of three of the leading powers.

MEETING POSTPONED.

Committee Will Vote Upon the Smoot Case Next Monday.

Seattle, May 17.—John H. Traville, who for more than a year has lived in Seattle, posing as a retired army officer, was arrested today at Mission Junction, B. C. Traville is wanted mainly on accusations that he has swindled various prominent women out of sums of money ranging from \$250 down on promises that he would secure for them lucrative positions with the government. He wired today that he would waive extradition and come to Seattle.

CONTRACT LET.

(Special to The Herald.) The secretary of the interior today executed a contract with and approved the bond of the United Iron Works of Oakland, Cal., for furnishing gates and lifting devices for use in the main canal and embankments of the Payette-Rose project, Idaho. The contract is for \$15,045.

SENTENCE COMMUTED.

Trenton, N. J., May 17.—The court of pardons today commuted the sentence of Mrs. Anna Valentina to life imprisonment. Mrs. Valentina was under sentence to be hanged at Hackensack on May 25 for the murder of Ross Saira.
